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## Introduction

- Scalars are difficult to resolve because large decay widths cause a strong overlap between resonances and background
- Several decay channels can open up within a short mass range (e.g., at the $K \bar{K}$ and $\eta \eta$ thresholds) producing cusps
- One expects non- $q \bar{q}$ objects like glueballs and multiquark states
- Special sophisticated analyses like PWA and Dalitz plot needed
- We briefly discuss $I=1 / 2, I=1$ and $I=0$ states since
the $(I=2) \pi \pi$ and $(I=3 / 2) K \pi$ phase shifts
do not exhibit any resonant behavior

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\text { The } I=1 / 2 \text { States - I }
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- The whole story began from the LASS experiment, which gave rise to numerous $K^{*}$ states by studying $K^{-} p \rightarrow \bar{K}^{0} \pi^{+} \pi^{-} n$ and $K^{-} p \rightarrow K^{-} \pi^{+} n$ at 11 GeV
- High-statistics measurements of $D$ decays with CLEO, FOCUS and E791 under favorable conditions of small combinatorial background
- Experiments at the $B$ factories (BaBar and Belle) have to account for $K^{*}$ 's although under rather ambiguous conditions
- $\tau$ decays into $K \pi$ and $K \pi \pi$ are a clean laboratory without background and final state interactions


## The $I=1 / 2$ States - II

| State | $K_{0}^{*}(800)$ | $K_{0}^{*}(1430)$ | $K_{0}^{*}(1950)$ |
| :--- | :---: | :---: | :--- |
| Mass, MeV | $682 \pm 29$ | $1425 \pm 50$ | $1945 \pm 10 \pm 20$ |
| Width, MeV | $547 \pm 24$ | $270 \pm 80$ | $201 \pm 34 \pm 79$ |

Some comments:

- $K_{0}^{*}(1430)$ is a difficult state to study with $K^{*}(1410)\left(J^{P}=1^{-}\right)$and $K_{2}^{*}(1430)\left(J^{P}=2^{+}\right)$nearby
- $\mathcal{B}(K \pi)=(93 \pm 10) \%$ is based on a single LASS measurement:
D. Aston et al., Nucl. Phys. 296 (1988) 493; $K^{-} p \rightarrow K^{-} \pi^{+} n$ at 11 GeV
- $K_{0}^{*}(1950)$ is solely based on the same LASS analysis, $\mathcal{B}(K \pi)=(52 \pm 14) \%$, confirmed by reanalysis of A. Anisovich (1997) and Z.Y. Zhou (2006)


## The $I=1 / 2$ States - III

- The $K^{*}(800)$ or $\kappa$ is still very controversial
- BES sees it in $J / \psi \rightarrow \bar{K}^{*} K \pi$, but at higher mass $\sim 850 \mathrm{MeV}$
- J.R. Pelaez, Mod. Phys. Lett. A19 (2004) 2879, obtains $M=753 \pm 52 \mathrm{MeV}, \Gamma=470 \pm 66 \mathrm{MeV}$ from $K \pi \rightarrow K \pi$ and S-matrix pole
- S. Descotes-Genon, B. Moussallam, Eur. Phys. J. C 48 (2006) 553 obtain $M=753 \pm 52 \mathrm{MeV}, \Gamma=557 \pm 24 \mathrm{MeV}$ from $K \pi \rightarrow K \pi$, S-matrix pole and applying Roy-Steiner equations
- D. Bugg, Phys. Rev. D 81 (2010) 014002 obtains
$M=663 \pm 35 \mathrm{MeV}, \Gamma=658 \pm 45 \mathrm{MeV}$ accounting for $s$-dependent width, couplings to $K \pi$ and $K \eta^{\prime}(958)$ and Adler zero

## The $I=1$ States - I

- Two isovector states are established: $a_{0}(980)$ and $a_{0}(1450)$
- $a_{0}(980)$ decays into $\eta \pi$ and $K \bar{K}$. The $K \bar{K}$ component is large, but the resonance is just below the threshold generating a cusp. Mass and width of the $a_{0}(980)$ can be strongly distorted, the results are strongly model-dependent
- $a_{0}(1450)$ is well above thresholds with various decays reported:
$\eta \pi, K \bar{K}, \eta^{\prime}(958) \pi, \omega \pi \pi, a_{0}(980) \pi \pi$


## The $I=1$ States - II

| State | $a_{0}(980)$ | $a_{0}(1450)$ |
| :---: | :---: | :---: |
| Mass, MeV | $980 \pm 20$ | $1474 \pm 19$ |
| Width, MeV | $50-100$ | $265 \pm 13$ |

- Large spread of values for the $a_{0}(980)$, strong model dependence; data for the $K \bar{K}$ are scarce, might be different from the $\eta \pi$ ?
- The $a_{0}(1450)$ parameters are based on Crystal Barrel p $\bar{p}$ data at rest, other analyses: a big spread from 1290 to 1565 MeV for mass, 80 to 270 MeV for width


## The $I=0$ States - I (General)

- The $I=0, J^{P C}=0^{++}$sector is the most complex
- Data exist in the $\pi \pi, K \bar{K}, \eta \eta, 4 \pi, \omega \omega$, and $\eta \eta^{\prime}(958)$ in $S$-wave
- Various production processes: $\pi N, p \bar{p}, J / \psi, D, B$ decays
- Five poles are needed: $f_{0}(500)$ or $\sigma, f_{0}(980), f_{0}(1370), f_{0}(1500)$, and $f_{0}(1710)$


## The $I=0$ States - II $(\sigma)$

- Long and controversial history
- $\pi \pi S$-wave phase shifts $\delta_{J}^{I}=\delta_{0}^{0}$ : old information from $\pi N$ scattering and new data near threshold from $K_{e 4}$ decay
- An enhancement in $M\left(\pi^{+} \pi^{-}\right)$is observed in $D^{+} \rightarrow \pi^{+} \pi^{-} \pi^{+}, J / \psi \rightarrow \omega \pi^{+} \pi^{-}$and $\psi(2 S) \rightarrow J / \psi \pi^{+} \pi^{-}$
- The $\pi \pi$ scattering amplitude has unusual energy dependence due to crossed channel exchanges and $f_{0}$ (1370)
- Analyses of $\pi \pi$ data that include unitarity, threshold behavior, constraints from Adler zeroes, scattering lengths and $K_{e 4}$ data find a light scalar with a pole near $(500-i 250) \mathrm{MeV}$


## The $I=0$ States - III $(\sigma)$

- Precise pole positions with uncertainties below 20 MeV were extracted using Roy equations and minimal data by the Bern group, B. Moussalam and R. Garcia-Martin et al.
- $\sqrt{s_{\text {Pole }}^{\sigma}}=(400-550)-i(200-350) \mathrm{MeV}$
- A more radical approach is to average the advanced dispersion analyses:
$\sqrt{s_{\text {Pole }}^{\sigma}}=(446 \pm 6)-i(276 \pm 5) \mathrm{MeV}$
- The $\gamma \gamma$ data are inconclusive due to its large width
- There are theoretical indications that the $f_{0}(500)$ is not a $q \bar{q}$


## The $I=0$ States - IV ( $\sigma$ pole position)



## The $I=0$ States $-\mathrm{V}\left(f_{0}(980)\right)$

- Seen very clearly as a narrow signal in many processes
- Overlaps strongly with the background from $f_{0}(500)$ and $f_{0}(1370)$, that can result in a dip in the $M(\pi \pi)$ spectrum at the $K \bar{K}$ threshold
- A dip changes to the $M\left(\pi^{0} \pi^{0}\right)$ peak in $\pi^{-} p \rightarrow \pi^{0} \pi^{0} n$
- Seen in $\phi \rightarrow \pi^{+} \pi^{-} \gamma, \pi^{0} \pi^{0} \gamma$ by KLOE, SND and CMD-2
- Also seen in various charmonium and $B$ meson decays
- A recent dispersive analysis of B. Moussallam and R. Garcia-Martin et al.!
- $M\left(f_{0}(980)\right)=990 \pm 20 \mathrm{MeV}$


## The $I=0$ States - VI ( $f_{0}(980)$ mass $)$



## The $I=0$ States - VII (Above 1 GeV )

- $f_{0}(1500)$ is well established and seen by Crystal Barrel in $p \bar{p}$ in five decay modes: $\pi \pi, K \bar{K}, \eta \eta, \eta \eta^{\prime}(958), 4 \pi$; also seen in central production
- $p \bar{p}, p \bar{n} / n \bar{p}$ show a single enhancement at 1400 MeV in $M(4 \pi)$ resolved in $f_{0}(1370)$ and $f_{0}(1500)$, the $4 \pi$ mode is abouf half of the $f_{0}(1500)$ and dominant for the $f_{0}(1370)$, other branchings rather uncertain
- Both Belle and BaBar observe scalars in $B$ and $D$ decays reporting broad or narrow structures between 1 and 1.6 GeV in $\pi^{+} \pi^{-}$and $K^{+} K^{-}$
- $f_{0}(1710)$ seen in $J / \psi$ radiative decays and central production mostly decays into $K \bar{K}$ and $\eta \eta ; \pi \pi$ and $\omega \omega$ possibly seen
- Belle studied $\gamma \gamma \rightarrow \pi^{0} \pi^{0}$, $(\eta \eta)$ and found an $S$-wave state with mass 1470 (1262) MeV and width 90 (484) MeV and huge errors


## The $I=0$ States - VIII (Summary)

| State | $\sqrt{s_{\text {pole }}}, \mathrm{MeV}$ | $M_{\mathrm{BW}}, \mathrm{MeV}$ | $\Gamma_{\mathrm{BW}}, \mathrm{MeV}$ |
| :--- | :---: | :---: | :---: |
| $f_{0}(500)$ | $(400-550) \mathrm{i}(200-350)$ | $400-1200$ | $600-1000$ |
| $f_{0}(980)$ | - | $990 \pm 20$ | $40-100$ |
| $f_{0}(1370)$ | $(1200-1500)-\mathrm{i}(150-250)$ | $1200-1500$ | $200-500$ |
| $f_{0}(1500)$ | - | $1505 \pm 6$ | $109 \pm 7$ |
| $f_{0}(1710)$ | - | $1720 \pm 6$ | $135 \pm 8$ |

The $\ll$ BW $\gg$ values are a mixture of Breit-Wigner and $S$-matrix poles Averaging hardly makes sense!

## Interpretation of the $I=0$ States -I (Below 1 GeV )

- $f_{0}(980)$ and $a_{0}(980)$ are 4 -quark states or molecules:
$\gamma \gamma$ is inconclusive, $f_{0}(980)$ has a large $s \bar{s}$ from $J / \psi$ and $D_{s}$ decays, $\phi \rightarrow f_{0}(980) \gamma$ and $\phi \rightarrow a_{0}(980) \gamma$ show a role of kaon loops
- $f_{0}(980), a_{0}(980), f_{0}(500)$ and $K_{0}^{*}(800)$ form a low-mass scalar nonet of predominantly four-quark states
- Models with chiral Lagrangians predict $f_{0}(500)$ and a nonet with $f_{0}(500), f_{0}(980), a_{0}(980)$ and $K_{0}^{*}(800)\left(\right.$ or $\left.K_{0}^{*}(1430)\right)$
- The unitarized quark model with coupled $q \bar{q}$ and meson-meson channels, light scalars are bare $q \bar{q}$ confinement states strongly shifted from 1.3-1.5 GeV due to strong coupling to $S$-wave two-meson decays.
$f_{0}(500), f_{0}(980), K_{0}^{*}(800)$ and $a_{0}(980)$ as well as
$f_{0}(1370), f_{0}(1500)$ (or $f_{0}(1710)$ ), $K_{0}^{*}(1430)$ and $a_{0}(1450)$ form two nonets manifestations of the same bare input states


## Interpretation of the $I=0$ States - II (Above 1 GeV )

- The $f_{0}(1370)$ and $f_{0}(1500)$ decay mostly into $2 \pi$ and $4 \pi$, while $f_{0}(1710)$ into $K \bar{K}$
- In the naive quark model $f_{0}(1370), a_{0}(1450)$ and $K_{0}^{*}(1430)$ - the same $\mathrm{SU}(3)$ flavor nonet as $(u \bar{u}+d \bar{d}), u \bar{d}$ and $u \bar{s}$ states, mixing with the light scalars (?), the $f_{0}(1710)$ is an $s \bar{s}$ state: $f_{0}(1710)\left(f_{2}^{\prime}(1525)\right)$ are produced in $p \bar{p}$, but suppressed compared to $f_{0}(1500)\left(f_{2}(1270)\right)$, and $f_{0}(1500)$ is also a $(u \bar{u}+d \bar{d})$, but very narrow and too light
- But in $\gamma \gamma$ the $f_{0}(1500)$ is not observed while the $f_{0}(1710)$ is, so it is mainly glue (?). The $f_{0}(1500)$ 's small width and enhanced production at small $p_{t}$ in central collisions favor its non $q \bar{q}$. In a mixing scheme of $F$. Close glue is shared between $f_{0}(1370)$, $f_{0}(1500)$ and $f_{0}(1710)$ (mainly $n \bar{n}$, glue and $s \bar{s}$ )
- In other schemes two-gluon coupling to $n \bar{n}$ is suppressed by chiral symmetry and $K \bar{K}$ is enhanced $\Rightarrow f_{0}(1710)$ is an unmixed glueball
- Broad $K K \bar{K}$ signal of Belle as a $f_{0}(1500)$ glueball, in conflict with BaBar
- $f_{0}(1370)$ and $f_{0}(1710)$ are bound states of two vectors


## Conclusions

- $f_{0}(500)(\sigma)$ definitely and $K_{0}^{*}(800)(\kappa)$ most probably exist
- Many other scalars observed, probably too many for normal $q \bar{q}$
- $\gamma \gamma$ collisions can help (?) with much larger data samples, KLOE-2 with taggers, CMD-3/SND, BES-III, Super $B$-factories
- Many interesting observations from the $J / \psi$ and $\psi(2 S)$ decays (BES), results from Belle and BaBar suffer from low data hadronic samples, but their $\tau$ decay data are very rich and potentially helpful
- Theoretical interpretation is very far from final and new experimental observations badly needed
- Strong model dependence, variety of approaches
- A nightmare for experiment and paradise for theory!
