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## Classification of diquark states

- Our diquarks have no spatial excitations (or better: we consider their excitations higher in energy than the hadrons we are going to study)
- This limits the possible states to:

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \left.\|[\overline{3}]_{f},[\overline{3}]_{c}, 0\right\rangle,\left|[66]_{f},[\overline{3}]_{c}, 1\right\rangle \\
& \left.\|[\overline{3}]_{f},[6]_{c}, 1\right\rangle,\left|[6]_{f},[6]_{c}, 0\right\rangle
\end{aligned}
$$

According to most models, color sextuplet are not a favored configuration (possibly not bound at all)

- Thus we will use only the scalar $\left(\mathrm{J}^{\mathrm{P}}=0^{+}\right)$, axial-vector $\left(\mathrm{J}^{\mathrm{P}}-1\right)$ diquarks

$$

## Tetraquarks

- Tetraquarks are exotic mesons composed of two quarks and two antiquarks
- They can have explicitly exotic quantum numbers (e.g. I=2 or $\mathrm{Y}=+2$ ) or the same quantum numbers of the normal mesons (cryptoexotics)
- No explicit exotics are known with certainty (several candidates: $\left.\pi_{1}(1400), Z^{+}(4430), \ldots\right)$
- Possible cryptoexotics (since Jaffe in the ${ }^{170}$ ): the light scalar nonet very well established: $\quad a_{0}(980), f_{0}(980)$ not so well established: $\quad f_{0}(600), k(800)$


## The light scalar nonet as tetraquark candidates

- The principal factors that urge the identification of the scalar nonet as tetraquarks are:
- The reversed spectrum of the nonet:

- The OZI rule violation in the hadron decays $\mathrm{f}_{0}(600) \longrightarrow \pi \pi, \mathrm{f}_{0}(980) \longrightarrow \mathrm{KK}$ not suppressed)
- The OZI rule violation in the radiative decays $\left(\phi(1020) \longrightarrow \mathrm{a}_{0}(980) \gamma\right)$


## Intrinsic degrees of freedom

- The intrinsic degrees of freedom are classified through the representations of the group $\mathrm{SU}_{\mathrm{st}}(6) \otimes \mathrm{SU}_{c}(3)$ $\mathrm{SU}_{\mathrm{sf}}(6)$
$[6] \otimes[\overline{6}] \otimes[6] \otimes[\overline{6}]=[1] \oplus[35] \oplus[35] \oplus(405] \oplus[35] \oplus[280) \oplus[35] \oplus[1] \oplus[280) \oplus[189]$
$\mathrm{SU}_{\mathrm{f}}(3)$

$$
[3] \otimes[3] \otimes[3] \otimes[3]=[1] \oplus[8] \oplus[8] \oplus[10] \oplus[8] \oplus[8] \oplus[1] \oplus(10] \oplus[(27]]
$$

SU( 3 ) only the (two) singlets are allowed physical states
$\mathrm{SU}_{s}(2)$

$$
[2] \otimes[2] \otimes[2] \otimes[2]=[1] \oplus[3] \oplus[1] \oplus[3] \oplus[3] \oplus[5]
$$

## Spatial degrees of freedom

- The orbital momenta and the spins are combined together to give the total angular momentum following the scheme:


$$
P=(-1)^{L_{13}+L_{24}+L_{12-34}} \quad C=(-1)^{L_{12-34}+S} \quad G=(-1)^{L_{12-34}+S+I}
$$

## Tetraquark states

## - Applying the Pauli principle we can write all the possible

 multiplets of the tetraquarks Scalar nonetTABLE III. Color, flavor, spin ( $S_{\text {tot }}$ ), and $J^{\text {PC }}$ for tetraquarks with $L_{13}=L_{24}=L_{12-34}=0$.

## Algebraic mass formula

- In order to calculate the tetraquark spectrum, we need now a mass formula
- Iachello et al. (Phys.Rev.D44,898 (1991)) developed an algebraic mass formula for the normal mesons based on a $\mathrm{SGA}=\mathrm{U}(4) \otimes \mathrm{SU}(3)_{\mathrm{F}} \otimes \mathrm{SU}(2)_{\mathrm{S}} \otimes \mathrm{SU}(3)_{\mathrm{C}}$ stringlike model
- The spatial part is described in terms of the Casimir operators of the chain: $\mathrm{U}(4) \supset \mathrm{SO}(4) \supset \mathrm{SO}(3) \supset \mathrm{SO}(2)$

The mass formula is:

$$
\begin{aligned}
& M^{2}=\left(N_{n} M_{n}+N_{s} M_{s}\right)^{2}+a v+b L+c S+d J+ \\
& +h\left\langle M^{\prime 2}\right\rangle_{i j, i^{\prime} j^{\prime}}+i\left\langle M^{\prime 2}\right\rangle_{i j, i^{\prime} j^{\prime}}
\end{aligned}
$$

(Regge trajectories: linear vibrational and rotational slope)

## Diquark-antidiquark limit

- For the tetraquark case one should introduce a new SGA for the spatial part, for example $\mathrm{U}(10)$ or $\mathrm{U}(4) \otimes \mathrm{U}(4) \otimes \mathrm{U}(4)$
- This is still work in progress
- We have developed also a diquark-antidiquark model for tetraquarks.
- In our model we freeze the spatial internal degrees of freedom inside the diquark.
- With these conditions, the diquark-antidiquark states are a subset of the states of the compact tetraquark, in particular the subset with $\mathrm{L}_{13}=\mathrm{L}_{24}=0$.


## Tetraquark nonet spectrum in the diquark-antidiquark limit

- We can use a mass formula similar to the one used for the normal mesons:

$$
M^{2}=\left(M_{q q}+M_{\bar{q} \bar{q}}\right)^{2}+a \cdot n+b \cdot L+c \cdot S+d \cdot J
$$

- We determine the diquark masses fitting the mass formula with the candidate tetraquark nonet masses. We obtain

$$
\mathrm{M}_{[\mathrm{n}, \mathrm{]}]}=0.275 \mathrm{GeV} \quad \mathrm{M}_{[\mathrm{n}, \mathrm{~s}]}=0.492 \mathrm{GeV}
$$

$\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{a0} 0(90)}=\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{fO} 980)}=0.984 \mathrm{GeV}$
$\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{fo}(600)}=0.550 \mathrm{GeV}$

$\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{k}(800)}=0.767 \mathrm{GeV}$

## Tetraquark spectrum

With the previous mass formula and the diquark masses we can determine the spectrum of all diquark-antidiquark states (preliminary extract of the first states, still necessary to
calculate decays)
