



Here we wish to summarize results on NbTi wires made of thin filaments.

M(H) curves were recorded with different magnetometers (VSM 12T, VSM 16 T, 5T SQUID Magnetometer), which have been cross checked against the calibrations.







In practical measurement for a NbTi wire we expect a symmetric curve with respect the x axis. Of course our measure includes the sample holder.

When using standard $V_{shield} = m/(\chi_0 B)$ the ratio λ/d_{fil} should be negligible to avoid large errors: *e.g.* for sample SL 86969 $(d_{fil}=2.5 \ \mu m)$ in 10 G we had $V_{shield}=0.753 \ mm^3$ while the wire section is 2.87 mm³ and $\alpha=1.55$ thus $V_{nominal}=1.131 \ mm^3$.

For Luvata 1 wire we found SC=0.45 mm³ to be compared to SC_{nominal}= 0.64 mm³

 χ_0 must be corrected according to R/ λ ratio but $\lambda(T)$ has to be determined

 $Q_{mag} = \oint m(B) dB$

In the IGC 944 wire we have $Q_{\text{mag}} \approx 1.23 \ 10^{-1} \text{ mJ in a} \pm 5 \text{ T}$ cycle

or $Q_{\text{mag}} \approx 58.5 \text{ mJ/cm}^3$ in a $\pm 5\text{T}$ cycle
