SIS 200

- RHIC dipole
- Collaboration with BNL
- Coil dominated: cosθ
- Maximum field: 3.5 T \Rightarrow 4 T
- Ramp rate: 70 mT/s \Rightarrow 1 T/s !!!
- Supercond. Rutherford cable
- One-phase helium cooling







SIS 200: R&D goals for GSI 001

- Reduce the effects due to the high ramp rate:
 - lower loss in wire, cable (core) and iron
 - better AC field quality
- Improve the cooling of the Rutherford cable
 - open Kapton insulation with laser cut holes
- Use collars to ensure long-term mechanical stability

UNK Dipole

- 2 layer $\cos\theta$ design
- 80mm bore \Rightarrow 100 mm
- 5.11 T ⇒ <mark>6 T</mark>
- 0.11 T/s \Rightarrow 1 T/s

Study by Technopark Kurchatov (Kurchatov Institut Moscow, IHEP, Protvino): Such a magnet is feasible, but needs a lot of R&D !





In order to reach 6 T central field with the desired 1 K temperature margin for the conductor, a wider conductor was required.

The dimensions of the CERN LHC dipole outer layer conductor(but with a core inserted for loss reduction) were chosen. The wire size was therefore increased from 0.65 mm to 0.825 mm.

To reduce filament hysteresis loss EAS had already started development of a 0.65 mm wire with 3.5 micron NbTi filaments, 1.8:1 Cu/NbTi ratio for SIS 200.

Order has been changed to 0.825 mm wire with 4.3 micron filaments for SIS 300.





IHEP 6T Dipole



•Central field: 6 T •Ramp rate: 1 T/s •Length: 1 m •Inner coil diameter: 100 mm •Two layers: inner: 4 blocks/outer: 3 blocks •Cooling: supercritical helium •Interlayer cooling channel •No holes in Kapton •Optimized end parts •Appropriate Ra of about 200 $\mu\Omega$ •Ready at the end of 2008

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SIS 300 lattice change

- To increase the acceptance a curved dipole option was chosen
- Change to FODO lattice
- Prototype development by INFN

Open Questions to be resolved

single stacking vs. double stacking (Filament distortion)
minimum twist pitch before degradation of Jc starts
optimum heat treatment (RRR)





INTAS Wires and Cables

Two Approaches: Hot Double Stacking Hot Single Stacking + Cold Bonding

Produced will be the following lengths

type	ca. length
1. Wire with diameter of 0.5 mm	400 m
2. Wire with diameter of 0.825 mm	250 m
3. Wire with diameter of 0.8 mm	250 m
4. Cable for SIS 100 2L coil (OD of CuNi-tube: 5.0 mm)	6 m
5. Cable for SIS 100 SL coil (OD of CuNi-tube: 5.7 mm)	6 m

Actual Status: Wire production nearly finished Measurements has started Cable production has started

Cable: Ra and Rc

High Ra and Rc:

- •low losses and no influence on field quality
- •without core: Ra=8Rc
- •reduced stability due to reduced current redistribution

Cored cable and strands with SnAg coating •High Rc (m Ω) \rightarrow significant loss reduction

 •Ra → can be adjudted so that losses and influence on field quality is reduced but current redistribution is still possible

R&D to find optimum Ra

•MQE-measurements for stability

•Heat treatment and curing cycles of coated cables

Disturbance energy spectra for LTS magnets

Typical disturbances of interest this research: Wire motion. (Training quenches)

Disturbance duration < 1 ms. Affected volume: 1 strand.

Cure Cycle

For the measurements described below, a RHIC-type cycle labeled GSI-II was used:

AIR

- 1. At 20°C apply 28 MPa
- 2. 20°C to 135°C ramp up in 50 min under 28 MPa,
- 3. At 135°C, apply pressure of 70 MPa and hold 30 min
- 4. Release all pressure and ramp up to 195°C in 30 min.
- 5. Apply 35 MPa and hold for 30 min.
- 6. Release pressure and ramp down to 135°C in 30 min.
- 7. Re-apply 70 MPa and hold for 30 min.
- 8. Cool down with 70 MPa.

A typical cure cycle is shown in Fig. 2.

- SIS 200: Model magnet GSI 001 was built and tested with regards to AClosses and field quality; the magnet could be ramped up to 4T 4T/s.
- 1m model dipole for SIS 300 doublet lattice was designed and is built at IHEP. Tests of this magnet at GSI in 2009
- Wire R&D: Low loss wires with small filament diameter and reduced twist pitch were developped and used for different model magnets (SIS300 and SIS100)
- Cable R&D: Optimium Ra of 200 μΩ was chosen from MQE measurement results; Heat treatment and curing recipe was established to reach this value.

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Quench protection

The protection scheme of the SIS300 dipole string will be one of the following:

- •dump resistors + cold diodes (on every magnet) + quench heaters (on every magnet) (Fig. 10)
- •dump resistors + warm bypass (bypassing 2 to 4 dipoles) + quench heaters (on every magnet)









Quench heaters

Calculations by D. Hagedorn: Quench heater should cover 12 turns

- Wires manufacturers give RRR = R_{300K} / R_{10K}
- because of CuMn: RRR_{wire} < RRR_{Cu}
- we would like to have:
 - R_{10K}, R_{300K}, distance between Voltage taps
- ρ_{CuMn_bulk} at 4, 77 and 300 K With this information, we reconstitute $R_{cable}\left(T\right)$

Instrumentation for Quench Studies

G-G

Quench Studies are needed to compare calculations for a magnet with CuMn wire to measurements.

This requires 1 spot heater 11 voltage taps
