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The main sources of losses in the cold mass of the dipole are:

- 1. Magnetic hysteresis in the s.c.
- 2. Eddy currents in conductor (inter-filaments and inter-strands)
- 3. Eddy currents in the collar and yoke
- 4. Eddy currents in the beam pipe
- 5. Magnetic hysteresis in the yoke

Losses in conductor

The hysteresis losses and inter-filament losses are calculated with

• Opera, Ansys and Fortran code from the conductor magnetization

$$P_{hyst.} = M_{hyst.}\dot{B}$$

$$P_{i.f.} = M_{i.f.} \dot{B}$$

• Roxie

The <u>interstrand coupling losses</u> have been calculated with:

• Excel code (only eddy current through Ra for transverse field)

$$p_{RA} = \rho_{RA} J_z^{2} = R_A \frac{b \cdot c}{2p_c} \cdot J_z^{2}$$

• Roxie

All the methods converge to similar results!

Losses in conductor: comparison between different codes

Average losses, during the ramp between 1.5 T and 4.5 T

Losses during the ramp are not constant:

@ B0 = 1.5 T P = 4.5 W/m

@ B0 = 4.5 T P = 2.6 W/m

Average

P = 3.5 W/m

Does it help for temperature margins ??



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Losses in the collar and yoke lamination

The losses due to the eddy currents in the laminations of the collar and of the yoke can be divided in two types:

- Losses due to *parallel* component of the magnetic field respect the lamination (in the 2-D & 3-D part of the magnet);
- 2. Losses due to the *perpendicular* component of the magnetic field respect the lamination (only in the 3-D part of the magnet).

1. Losses for the *parallel* component of the magnetic field:



The RMS current density (averaged on the lamination thickness Δs) can be evaluated analytically with a "1-D analysis":

$$\left[J_{B_{II}}(x,y)\right]_{\Delta s-RMS} = \frac{1}{2\sqrt{3}\rho} \dot{B}_{II}(x,y)\Delta s$$

where the magnetic field *B* is approximated to the magneto-static field (the field perturbation due to eddy currents is neglected).

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As consequence the volumetric losses in the laminations can be calculated easily:

$$p_{B//}(x,y) = \rho \cdot \{ [J_{B//}]_{\Delta s - RMS} \}^2 = \frac{1}{12\rho} \dot{B}_{//}(x,y)^2 \Delta s^2$$

This simplified 1-D model has been validated by a complete 3-D description of the collar, with ELEKTRA-3D

$$P_{B/\prime} = \int_{Collar area} \frac{1}{12\rho} \dot{B}_{\prime\prime}^{2} \Delta s^{2} d\Sigma \cong P_{3-D}(ELEKTRA) = 5.7 \text{ mW/m}$$

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Plot of the eddy current pattern, in a full 3-D description of the collar with the true lamination thickness.



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2. Losses for the *perpendicular* component of the magnetic field:

In the **coil end**, there is also the *z*-component of the field *B* (in addition to the parallel components of the field), which produces *additional* eddy currents $J_{B\perp}$ in the *x* and *y* directions.

If the B_z varies smoothly in *z*-direction, we can assume $J_{B\perp}$ is constant in the lamination thickness Δs :



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Consequently the $J_{B\perp}$ can be calculated with ELEKTRA 3-D, assuming, *instead of lamination*, an anisotropic material with electrical conductivity σ :

$$\begin{cases} \sigma_{x} = \frac{1}{\rho} \\ \sigma_{y} = \frac{1}{\rho} \\ \sigma_{z} = 0 \end{cases}$$

with
$$\rho = \rho_{collar} \approx \rho_{iron} \approx 5.3 \cdot 10^{-7} \,\Omega \mathrm{m}$$

The yoke laminations have an anisotropic behavior also for the <u>reluctivity</u> (stacking factor = 0.97).

The stacking factor reduces the penetration of Bz in the yoke.

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Consequently, the yoke laminations have been treated with ELEKTRA 3-D as an *homogenous* material, but with *anistropic* behavior both for the <u>electrical resistivity</u> and <u>magnetic reluctivity</u>.

If we are interested to the to the power density in the lamination $p_{\Delta s-av}(x,y)$:

$$p_{\Delta s-av.}(x,y) = \rho \cdot \{ [J_{tot}]_{\Delta s-RMS} \}^2 = \rho \cdot \{ [J_{B\perp} + J_{B//}]_{\Delta s-RMS} \}^2$$

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$$\{J_{B\perp} + J_{B//}]_{\Delta s = \text{thickness}} \xrightarrow{\mathbf{y}}_{\mathbf{x}} \times \begin{bmatrix} J_{B\perp} + J_{B//} \end{bmatrix}_{\Delta s = \text{thickness}} \xrightarrow{\mathbf{y}}_{\mathbf{x}} \times \begin{bmatrix} J_{B\perp} + J_{B//} \end{bmatrix}_{\Delta s = \text{thickness}} \end{bmatrix}_{\Delta s = \text{thickness}} \begin{bmatrix} J_{B} + J_{B//} \end{bmatrix}_{\Delta s = \text{thickness}} \begin{bmatrix} J_{B} + J_{B//} \end{bmatrix}_{\Delta s = \text{thickness}} \end{bmatrix}_{\Delta s =$$

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The total power for eddy currents in the laminations:

$$p_{\Delta s-av.}(x,y) = p_{B//}(x,y) + p_{B\perp}(x,y) = \frac{1}{12\rho} \dot{B}_{//}(x,y)^2 \Delta s^2 + \rho \cdot J_{B\perp}(x,y)^2$$

So the losses can be calculated "easily" in all the laminated regions *without* the necessity of modeling each single lamination.

It is possible just to add the two powers!

1/8 of the model (1.2 m long)



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View of eddy currents (arrows) and losses (colors, W/m³) during the magnet ramp-up ($dB_o/dt=1$ T/s), at $B_o=1.5$ T.

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View of eddy currents (arrows) and losses (colors, W/m³) during the magnet ramp-up ($dB_o/dt=1$ T/s), at $B_o=4.5$ T.

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Other main sources of losses are the eddy currents in pins and keys in the collar and yoke laminations (they are like short-circuit for eddy current)

The study of these dissipative powers has been done with OPERA-3D & validated with analytical approaches.



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The position of the yoke pins has been optimized in order to reduce the eddy currents and the losses



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Another important conclusion is that the electrical contact between the yoke lamination and the He cylindrical vessel must be avoid.



Current in the He cylindrical vessel @ 4.5 T

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Eddy current in beam pipe

• In this case the eddy currents are directed in z direction, and the power/length *P* can be analytical calculated:

$$P = \int_{r_{inner}}^{r_{outer}} \int_{0}^{2\pi} \rho \cdot J_{Z}^{2} \cdot r \cdot d\theta dr \approx \frac{\pi}{\rho} \dot{B}_{0}^{2} \cdot r_{av}^{3} \cdot \Delta r$$

where r_{av} =44 mm is the average radius of the beam pipe and $\Delta r = 2$ mm is the pipe thickness

P = 1.0 W/m

(not negligible thermal load for the cooling gas)

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Losses for the yoke magnetic hysteresis

•These losses have been estimated starting from the specification given for the material:

•The lamination (used for standard application in ac) is classified as M600-100A (European norm EN 10106-2007)

•The maximum **total** losses is **6** W/kg, when subjected to a sinusoidal field with frequency 50 Hz and peak field Bp=1.5 T, at room temperature.

•From this total losses, the contribution for *eddy current* can separated easily:

$$p_{ac} = \frac{\pi^2 \cdot v^2}{6\rho \cdot \delta} B_p^2 \Delta s^2 = 2.8 \text{ W/kg}$$

•The contribution for *hysteresis* has been measured in similar materials by IHEP, and is about 1.75 W/kg

•The remaining part is due to the anomalous losses, about 1.45 W/kg

•In order to have the same *hysteretic* losses (1.75 W/kg) in an ac field calculation at 50 Hz, a suitable **constant phase lag** of 10° has to be introduced between *B* and *H*.

•Using the same constant phase in our operative condition with a 2-D magnetic analysis (code FEMM), we obtained an average **hysteretic losses** of about **1.8 W/m.**

•The anomalous losses scale with $v^{1.5}$ and consequently decreases very fast as the frequency v decreases, and can be neglected in our operating conditions.

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•The ramp rate losses range between **28** W (high field) and **34** W (low field).

• This mean that the specific loss in the cold mass is between **7.0 W/m** and **8.7 W/m** (including coil ends). Acceptable.

• The contribution of the conductor only in losses is between 40% (high field) and 55% (low field).

• The loss map in the conductor has allowed the thermal analysis for the study of the **temperature in conductors**.
