## Kolmogorov-Smirnov test

Kolmogorov test<sup>1</sup> measures the maximum absolute deviation between the empirical distribution function of a sample and the empirical distribution function of a theoretical function:

$$D_n(x) = \sup_x |F(x) - F_n(x)|$$

Smirnov test (better known as Kolmogorov-Smirnov test) is based on Kolmogorov statistics and concerns the comparison of two samples<sup>2</sup>. The aim of this test is to compare two distributions, f and g with respectively n and m observations, in order to test whether the two independent samples involved have been drawn from the same population.

Deriving from Kolmogorov test statistics, the test statistics  $D_{n,m}$  computation involves the two empirical distribution functions F and G. If the two samples have been drawn from the same population distribution, the cumulative distributions of both samples may be expected to be close to each other; if the two sample cumulative distributions differ, this suggests that the samples come from different populations.

$$D_{n,m}(x) = \sup_{x} |F_n(x) - G_m(x)|$$

The asymptotic probability is the following:

$$\lim_{n \to \infty} P(\sqrt{n}D_n > z) = 2\sum_{k=1}^{\infty} (-1)^{k-1} \cdot e^{-2k^2z^2}$$

where the quantity  $\lambda$  is defined:

$$\lambda_{obs} = \left[\sqrt{\frac{n \cdot m}{n+m}} + 0.12 + \frac{0.12}{\sqrt{\frac{n \cdot m}{n+m}}}\right] \cdot D_{obs}$$
