Energy dependent approach

In many cases an unambiguous partial wave decomposition at fixed energies is impossible. Then the energy and angular parts should be analyzed together:

Minimization methods

1. The two body final states $\pi N, \gamma N \to \pi N, \eta N, K\Lambda, K\Sigma, \omega N, K^*\Lambda$: χ^2 method. For *n* measured bins we minimize

Present solution $\chi^2 = 48710$ for 31180 points. $\chi^2/N_F = 1.6$

2. Reactions with three or more final states are analyzed with logarithm likelihood method. $\pi N, \gamma N \to \pi \pi N, \pi \eta N, \omega p, K^* \Lambda$. The minimization function:

This method allows us to take into account all correlations in many dimensional phase space. Above 500 000 data events are taken in the fit.

Summary

- Bonn-Gatchina new combined analysis of modern data base is completed.
- The investigation of the reactions with $K\Sigma$ final state revealed an ambiguity in the sign of the $K\Sigma$ coupling constants of leading nucleon partial wave amplitudes. New data on polarization observables either from reaction $\pi^-p \to K^+\Sigma^-$ or from $\gamma p \to K^0\Sigma^0$ should resolve this ambiguity.
- The new solution compares favorably to the solution obtained by the Bonn-Jülich group. It proves, that the result is mainly defined by the data base, but not by the analysis method.
- The prediction for new CLAS beam asymmetry data on single pion photoproduction is notably better from 2013 solutions than from BG2011-02. The new analyses includes new polarization data on π^0 photoproduction from CB-ELSA. It supports statement that the solution is mainly defined by the data included in the analysis.
- The vector photo production is included in the fitting program and comprehensively tested. First results are obtained and we are ready to start full investigation of these reactions.
