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The excited hadron spectrum: Connection between experiment and QCD

Predictions for resonances (e.g. from lattice calculations, Dyson-Schwinger, quark models)

⇔ Intensive experimental effort (e.g. at MAMI, ELSA, JLab (CLAS), ...)

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Theoretical data analysis required

(e.g. GWU SAID, DMT, Gießen, Bonn-Gatchina, MAID, ANL-Osaka, Zagreb, KSU, ...)





Combine different reaction in a simultaneous analysis:
 Dynamical coupled-channel models

Basic features of the Jülich model



Analyticity is respected

- real parts of T
- correct structure of branch points and cuts
- \hookrightarrow Resonance parameters in terms of **poles** and **residues**

● Unitarity is respected → meson exchange from 3-body unitarity

Analysis details

- Simultaneous fit to elastic πN PW and $\pi N \rightarrow \eta N$, KY observables $(d\sigma/d\Omega, P, \beta)$
- 196 free parameters, minimization using MINUIT on the JUROPA supercomputer

- ⇒ microscopic reaction dynamics
 - E.g.: gauge invariance restoring contribution removed



New approach:

Combine good **analytic** properties of Jülich hadronic *T*-matrix with a

flexible and model independent parameterization of photo excitation

- \Rightarrow analyze large amounts of data
- ⇒ electromagnetic resonance parameter

The photoproduction amplitude

 $T_{\mu\kappa}$: Jülich hadronic *T*-matrix

 \rightarrow Watson's theorem fulfilled by construction

The phenomenological potential



 $\tilde{\gamma}^{a}_{\mu;i'}, \gamma^{a}_{\mu;i}$ hadronic vertices \rightarrow correct threshold behaviour *i*: resonance number per multipole

- μ : channels πN , ηN , $\pi \Delta$
 - \Rightarrow Fit for $\gamma p \rightarrow \pi^0 p$, $\pi^+ n$
 - fit in 2 steps:
 - 1. to GWU/SAID CM12 multipoles \Rightarrow good starting point for observables
 - **2.** to data : $d\sigma/d\Omega$, Σ , T and $P \Rightarrow$ final solution

Data base: GWU/SAID up to 2.4 GeV, + 5% syst. error $\sim 22~000~{\rm data}~{\rm points}$

 - ($\chi^2/(\#$ data #parms)=1.08, including 5% syst. err.)
 - \rightarrow Predictions for *G*, *H* and *E*
 - ightarrow Photo residues determined

- Improve high energy limit
- Formalism prepared for η and K photoproduction

Isospin breaking in the πN channel

- Hadronic reactions: data well above threshold \rightarrow isospin averaged masses
- Pion-photoproduction: data near threshold \rightarrow include isospin breaking \hookrightarrow use exact π^0 (π^+) and p (n) mass
