Constraining Single-Energy PWAs Using Energy-Dependent PWAs

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#### **Overview: Reactions Included in Recent PWAs**

$$\begin{array}{ll} K^-p \to K^-p & \pi^-p \to \eta n \\ K^-p \to \overline{K^0}n & \pi^-p \to K^0 \Lambda \end{array}$$

$$K^-p \to \pi^0 \Lambda$$

$$\begin{array}{l} K^- p \to \pi^+ \Sigma^- \\ K^- p \to \pi^0 \Sigma^0 \\ K^- p \to \pi^- \Sigma^+ \end{array}$$

#### **Constraints on Single-Energy PWAs of KN Scattering**

- Small amplitudes ( $|\mathbf{T}(E_0)| < 0.05$ ) held fixed using unitarized solution
- Selected data bins of 20 MeV width
- Introduce penalty term in  $\chi^2$  to constrain fitted amplitudes
- Parameterize each amplitude in bin by:

$$T(E) = T(E_0) + T'(E_0)(E - E_0)$$

where E is c. m. energy of data point in bin,

 $E_0$  is central energy in bin,

 $T(E_0)$  is the complex **T**-matrix amplitude at c. m. energy  $E_0$ ,

 $T(E_0)$  is "slope parameter" which is fixed at value from unitarized solution.

#### **Multichannel Parametrization of Amplitudes**

The "KSU Model" satisfies unitarity and time-reversal invariance. The total partial-wave Smatrix has the form

 $S = B^T R B$ 

where the background matrix **B** is unitary but not generally symmetric:

$$\mathbf{B}=\mathbf{B}_1\mathbf{B}_2\cdots\mathbf{B}_n$$

The matrix **R** is both unitary and symmetric. It is a generalization of the multichannel BW form to include multiple resonances. It is constructed from a Kmatrix:

$$\mathbf{R} = \mathbf{I} + 2\mathrm{i}\mathbf{K}(1 - \mathrm{i}\mathbf{K})^{-1}$$

# Analyses of $\pi N$ Scattering

- Results will now be presented for multichannel PWA of πN scattering in c.m. energy range 1.08-2.10 GeV.
- Includes new solutions for  $\pi N \rightarrow \eta N$  and  $\pi N \rightarrow K\Lambda$  amplitudes determined from single-energy analyses.
- Global energy-dependent fits resulted in smooth amplitudes consistent with S-matrix unitarity.
- Resonance parameters were obtained as results of global energy-dependent fits.

# Single-Energy Fits for $\pi N$ Reactions

- We began by assembling database of all available data for  $\pi^-p \rightarrow \eta n$  and  $\pi^-p \rightarrow K^0 \Lambda$ .
- Data were analyzed in bins of width 30 MeV.
- Data for π<sup>-</sup>p→ηn spanned c.m. energies
   1530±15 MeV to 2070±15 MeV.
- Data for π<sup>-</sup>p→K<sup>0</sup>Λ spanned c.m. energies 1648±15 MeV to 2068±15 MeV.
- In each energy bin, PW amplitudes were fitted as complex constants.

# Single-Energy Fits (Cont'd)

- We began by fitting the lowest energy bins, which were dominated by the S<sub>11</sub> wave. As we moved to higher energy bins, additional partial waves were added as needed until we reached the highest energy bin.
- The initial single-energy amplitudes provided excellent fits to the data but were noisy. These were then included in global energy-dependent fits with amplitudes for πN→πN, πN→ππN, and γN→πN.
- The global fits resulted in smooth amplitudes consistent with S-matrix unitarity, but the smoothed amplitudes no longer provided excellent agreement with dσ/dΩ and polarization data.

# Single-Energy Fits (Cont'd)

- We next iterated the single-energy fits. For the ηN fits, small amplitudes (with |T|<0.02) were held fixed at values from the global fits. This constraint resulted in somewhat smoother energy-dependent amplitudes.
- The D<sub>13</sub> amplitudes were found to be small over the entire energy range, as expected since  $\pi\pi$ N channels are known to saturate the unitary bound for D<sub>13</sub>. The D<sub>13</sub> amplitudes were omitted in subsequent fits.
- For  $\pi N \rightarrow \eta N$ , the important partial waves were found to be  $S_{11}$ ,  $P_{11}$ ,  $P_{13}$ ,  $D_{15}$ ,  $F_{15}$ , and  $G_{17}$ .
- For  $\pi N \rightarrow K\Lambda$ , the important partial waves were found to be  $S_{11}$ ,  $P_{11}$ ,  $P_{13}$ ,  $D_{15}$ , and  $F_{15}$ . Some small higher waves were also included.

# Single-Energy Fits (Cont'd)

- We iterated between the single-energy fits and the global energy-dependent fits. In subsequent iterations, we added additional constraints to the single-energy fits by holding some of the larger amplitudes fixed at the values from the global energy-dependent fits.
- Initially only S<sub>11</sub> amplitudes were held fixed, so the single-energy fits became more constrained and resulted in smoother values for the smaller amplitudes.
- In the final round, S<sub>11</sub> and P<sub>11</sub> amplitudes were held fixed while the other amplitudes were varied.

- $\pi N \rightarrow \pi N$  amplitudes (SAID SP06 sol' n)
- $\gamma N \rightarrow \pi N$  amlitudes (SAID FA07 sol' n)
- πN→ππN amplitudes (DMM *et al.*, PRD **30**, 904 (1984))
- $\pi N \rightarrow \eta N$  (this work)
- $\pi N \rightarrow K\Lambda$  (this work)
- "KSU Model" was used to provide a unitary, multichannel parametrization of partial-wave amplitudes

# **Determination of Fitting Errors**

- The fitting parameters for resonances are signed couplings  $(\pm\sqrt{\Gamma_i})$  and Breit-Wigner masses (M), where  $\Gamma_i$  is the partial width for the i<sup>th</sup> channel evaluated at c.m. energy M
- Calculated resonance parameters are the partial widths, total width  $\Gamma = \Sigma \Gamma_i$ , branching ratios  $x_i = \Gamma_i / \Gamma$ , and "resonant amplitudes,  $\pm \sqrt{x} x_i$ , where x is the elasticity or branching ratio for the elastic channel
- The full error matrix was used to propagate fitting errors into the calculated resonance parameters (errors were not determined for pole positions)
- During intermediate fits, some parameters were held fixed. For example, the mass of a high-mass resonance might be held fixed.
- After fit parameters had been determined, a final "zeroth-iteration" fit was done to determine fitting errors. This did not alter values of fit parameters but in this zeroth-iteration fit, all fitting parameters were treated as free parameters in order to take correlations into effect.

## **Determination of Fitting Errors (continued)**

- In addition, for the final fits, we increased error bars for some of the single-energy amplitudes included in the fits. If a given single-energy amplitude contributed  $\chi^2 > 10$ , we increased its error bars so that it contributed  $\chi^2 = 4$ instead. This was done because we felt some singleenergy amplitudes had under-estimated error bars and we wanted to weaken their effect on the fits but did not want to remove the points outright.
- Finally, for our published resonance parameters (partial widths, branching ratios, BW masses and widths) we increased the error bars by scaling the fit errors by  $\sqrt{\chi^2/v}$ , where v is the number of degrees of freedom.

## **Comments on Fitting Errors**

- Some colleagues have remarked that our new error bars are "too small". This comment may be based on a comparison with parameters from D.M. Manley and E.M. Saleski, PRD 45, 4002 (1992).
- We note that in that publication (20 years ago), the πN amplitudes included in the fits were from the old 1979-1980 Carnegie Mellon-Berkeley and Karlsruhe-Helsinki PWAs. Resonance parameters from that paper were also scaled up by the square root of the reduced χ<sup>2</sup>. Differences and inconsistencies between these PWAs led to the larger uncertainties in our 1992 published resonance parameters.

## Comments on Fitting Errors (continued)

- Resonance parameters from our current work are more tightly constrained because we include in the fits pion photoproduction amplitudes and amplitudes for ηN and KΛ, in addition to πN elastic and ππN amplitudes.
- Furthermore, our pion photoproduction amplitudes (SAID FA07) and πN elastic amplitudes (SAID SP06) are much more self consistent. When they can be compared, our new error bars are typically smaller than those in R.A. Arndt *et al.*, PRC **74**, 045205 (2006).

## Summary and Acknowledgments

- Single-energy amplitudes for several hadronic reactions have been determined by constrained analyses up to a c.m. energy of 2.1 GeV.
- Energy-dependent multichannel solutions consistent with S-matrix unitarity were obtained, allowing resonance parameters to be determined in a consistent way for many channels.
- These results provide tests of quark-model predictions and lattice gauge theory calculations.
- Work has begun on a PWA of  $\gamma p \rightarrow \eta p$ .
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
