## Why spectroscopy?

- Spectroscopy provides a test of QCD models
- Comparison of properties such as masses, lifetimes, decay properties
- Many predicted states not yet observed or poorly measured
- Searches for new/exotic states
- Shed light on the nature of some of the XYZ states

## The LHCb experiment

- LHC is the largest source of b (and c) hadrons:  $\sigma_{b\bar{b}} \approx 284 \ \mu b \ @ 7 \ TeV \ [\sim 10^6 \ b\bar{b}/s] \ [PLB \ 694, \ 209]$  $\sigma_{c\bar{c}} \approx 20 \times \sigma_{b\bar{b}} \ [Nucl.Phys.B871(2013)1-20]$
- LHCb designed to study rare decays and CP violation in  $b/c\mbox{-hadrons}$  ideal place also for spectroscopy
- Forward single-arm spectrometer (pseudorapidity region  $2 < \eta < 5$ )



Excellent performance:

- precise vertexing and momentum resolution
- Excellent particle ID performance
- Excellent trigger selecting high- $p_t$  lepton or hadron from displaced vertexes

## Data samples

LHCb Integrated Luminosity pp collisions 2010-2012



LHCb is in very good shape:

- $37 \text{ pb}^{-1}$  at  $\sqrt{s} = 7 \text{ TeV}$ recorded in 2010
- $1.1 \,\mathrm{fb^{-1}}$  at  $\sqrt{s} = 7 \,\mathrm{TeV}$  in 2011
- $2 \text{ fb}^{-1}$  at  $\sqrt{s} = 8 \text{ TeV}$  in 2012

• Total statistics available on tape:  $\sim 3 \, \mathrm{fb}^{-1}$ 

## $B_c^+$ meson

- Unique meson composed of two heavy quarks decaying weakly
- Decays via
  - $\bar{b} \rightarrow \bar{c}/\bar{u}$  transitions
  - $c \rightarrow s/d$  transitions
  - $\bar{b}c \rightarrow W$  annihilations
- Observed by CDF in  $J/\psi\ell\nu$  decays and  $J/\psi\pi^+$  [PRL 81,2432(1998); PRL 96,082002(2008)]



- Confirmed by LHCb in  $B_c^+\to J/\psi\pi^+$  with  $0.37\,{\rm fb}^{-1}$  measuring the mass and the production  $_{\rm [PRL\ 109\ 232001\ (2012)]}$
- Many other  $B_c$  decay modes observed at LHCb

## Observation of $B_c^+ \rightarrow J/\psi D_s^{(*)+}$ [PRD 87 (2013) 112012]



- Spectator diagram dominant, possible contributions from colour suppressed spectator and annihilation
- Reconstruct  $J/\psi \to \mu\mu$  and  $D^+_s \to \phi\pi^+ \to (K^+K^-)\pi^+$

Excess of more than  $9\sigma$  for both channels

• Partially reconstructed  $B_c^+ \to J/\psi D^{*+}$ where  $D_s^{*+} \to D_s^+(\gamma/\pi^0)$ : broad bump whose shape depends on  $A_{\pm\pm}$  and  $A_{00}$ helicity amplitudes (from simulation)



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# Observation of $B_c^+ \to J/\psi D_s^{(*)+}$ [PRD 87 (2013) 112012]

Normalize to 
$$J/\psi\pi^+$$
:  $\mathcal{R}_{D_s^{(*)+}/\pi^+} = \frac{1}{\mathcal{B}_{D_s^+}}$   
 $\frac{\mathcal{B}(B_c^+ \to J/\psi D_s^+)}{\mathcal{B}(B_c^+ \to J/\psi D_s^+)} = 2.96 \pm 0.67 \pm 0.25$   
 $\frac{\mathcal{B}(B_c^+ \to J/\psi D_s^{*+})}{\mathcal{B}(B_c^+ \to J/\psi D_s^{*+})} = 2.36 \pm 0.56 \pm 0.10$ 

• Main systematics:  $\mathcal{B}(D_s^+ \to \phi(\to K^+K^-)\pi^+)$ 

$$\begin{split} \mathcal{R}_{D_s^*\!/\pi^+} &\equiv \quad \frac{\Gamma\left(B_c^+\to J/\psi\,D_s^+\right)}{\Gamma\left(B_c^+\to J/\psi\,D_s^+\right)} \approx \frac{\Gamma\left(B\to\overline{D}^*D_s^+\right)}{\Gamma\left(B\to\overline{D}^*\pi^+\right)}, \\ \mathcal{R}_{D_s^*\!/D_s^*} &\equiv \quad \frac{\Gamma\left(B_c^+\to J/\psi\,D_s^*\right)}{\Gamma\left(B_c^+\to J/\psi\,D_s^+\right)} \approx \frac{\Gamma\left(B\to\overline{D}^*D_s^*\right)}{\Gamma\left(B\to\overline{D}^*D_s^*\right)} \end{split}$$

• Results consistent with spectator dominance + naïve factorization (replace spectator  $c \rightarrow u/d$ )



The fraction of polarization amplitude  $\frac{\Gamma_{\pm\pm}(B_c^+ \to J/\psi D_s^{*+})}{\Gamma_{tot}(B_c^+ \to J/\psi D_s^{*+})} = (52 \pm 20)\% \text{ also}$ compatible with measurements in  $B^0 \to D^{*-} D_s^{*+}$  by CLEO and BaBar [PRD 62, 112003 (2000), PRD 67,092003 (2003)]

## $B_c^+$ mass @ LHCb [prl 109 232001 (2012) - prd 87 (2013) 112012]

- $B_c$  mass determined from  $J/\psi\pi^+$  decays
- Rather large Q-value → large systematic uncertainty from momentum scale
- New measurement using  $B_c \rightarrow J/\psi D_s^+$  (low Q-value)

$$m_{B_c^+} - m_{D_s^+} = 4307.97 \pm 1.44_{stat} \pm 0.20_{syst} \,\mathrm{MeV/c^2}$$

- Dominant systematics from  $D_s$  mass largely cancels in the mass difference
  - Using our latest  $D_s^+$  mass measurement [arXiv:1304.6865]

$$m_{B_{a}^{+}} = 6276.28 \pm 1.44_{stat} \pm 0.36_{syst} \,\mathrm{MeV}/c^{2}$$

• Single most precise measurement of  $B_c^+$  mass

## **Observation** $B_c^+ \rightarrow B_s^0 \pi^+$ [arXiv:1308.4544]

- First decay where the b quark is acting as a spectator
- *b*-quark decay should give larger rate
- Wide range of theoretical predictions for  $\mathcal{B}(B_c^+ \to B_s^0 \pi^+)$



- Experimental clarification needed
  - Using both 2011 data  $(1\,{\rm fb^{-1}}$  at  $\sqrt{s}=7\,{\rm TeV})$  and 2012 data  $(2\,{\rm fb^{-1}}$  at  $\sqrt{s}=8\,{\rm TeV})$
  - Reconstructed either in  $B^0_s\to J/\psi\phi$  or  $B^0_s\to D^-_s\pi^+$  with  $\phi\to K^+K^-$  and  $D^-_s\to K^+K^-\pi^-$



• First observation of a weak decay of a B meson to another B meson

$$\frac{\sigma(B_c^+)}{\sigma(B_s^0)} \times \mathcal{B}(B_c^+ \to B_s^0 \pi^+) = (2.38 \pm 0.35(stat) \pm 0.11(syst) ^{+0.17}_{-0.12}(\tau_{B_c^+})) \times 10^{-3}$$

• Using an estimate of  $\frac{\sigma(B_c^+)}{\sigma(B_s^0)} \sim 0.02$ ,  $\mathcal{B}(B_c^+ \to B_s^0 \pi^+) \approx 10\%$ 

• Largest exclusive branching fraction of any known weak *B* meson decay R. Cardinale on behalf of the LHCb Collaboration PWA7, Camogli (Italy), September 23-27, 2013 11

## **Excited** *B<sub>sJ</sub>* mesons

- $B_{s2}^*$  first observed by CDF [PRL 100, 082002 (2008)] in BK invariant mass spectrum, confirmed by D0 [PRL 100, 082001 (2008)]
- Observation of a second peak identified as partially reconstructed  $B_{s1}$ , not confirmed by D0



Search for excited  $B_{sJ}$  mesons at LHCb  $[1 \, {
m fb}^{-1}]$  [PRL 110, 151803 (2013)]

• Search for  $B_{sJ}$  mesons in  $B_{sJ} \to B^{+(*)}K^- \to (\gamma)B^+K^-$ 

• Select  $B^+$  candidates in four different final states

a) 
$$J/\psi K^+ \to (\mu^+\mu^-)K^+$$
  
b)  $\bar{D}^0\pi^+ \to (K^+\pi^-)\pi^+$   
c)  $\bar{D}^0\pi^+ \to (K^+\pi^-\pi^+\pi^-)\pi^+$ 

d) 
$$\bar{D}^0 \pi^+ \pi^- \pi^+ \to (K^+ \pi^-) \pi^+ \pi^- \pi^+$$

• Combine the  $B^+$  with a K-

## $B^+K^-$ spectrum [PRL 110, 151803 (2013)]

The  $\Delta M = M(B^+K^-) - M(B^+) - M(K^-)$  spectrum shows 3 peaks:

- partially reconstructed  $B_{s1} \rightarrow B^{*+}K^{-} \rightarrow B^{+}(\gamma)K^{-}$ confirm CDF signal
- partially reconstructed  $B_{s2}^* \rightarrow B^{*+}K^- \rightarrow B^+(\gamma)K^$ first observation, 8  $\sigma$
- fully reconstructed  $B_{s2}^* \rightarrow B^+ K^-$  decays confirm CDF and D0 signal



### Results [PRL 110, 151803 (2013)]

- $\Gamma(B^*_{s2}) = 1.5 \pm 0.13 \pm 0.47 \,\mathrm{MeV}/c^2$  first measurement!
- Dominant systematics: invariant mass resolution
- The difference between the fully reconstructed and partially reconstructed  $B^*_{s2}$  is equal to  $M(B^{*+}) M(B^+) = 45.01 \pm 0.30 \pm 0.23 \, {\rm MeV}/c^2$
- $\bullet\,$  Best measurement: new method compared to earlier measurements, does not require  $\gamma\,$
- Absolute mass values are derived using the known  $B^+$  mass:  $m(B^{*+}) = 5324.26 \pm 0.30 \pm 0.23 \pm 0.17 \,\mathrm{MeV}/c^2$   $m(B_{s1}) = 5828.40 \pm 0.04 \pm 0.04 \pm 0.41 \,\mathrm{MeV}/c^2$  $m(B_{s2}^*) = 5839.99 \pm 0.05 \pm 0.11 \pm 0.17 \,\mathrm{MeV}/c^2$
- Precise  $B^{*+}$  mass measurement used to understand if the  $Z_b$  states reported by Belle could be  $B\bar{B}^*$  molecules:
  - the  $Z_b(10610)^+$  lies 3.69±2.05 MeV/ $c^2$  above the  $B\bar{B}^*$  threshold • the  $Z_b(10650)^+$  lies 3.68±1.68 MeV/ $c^2$  above the  $B^*\bar{B}^*$  threshold

## **Excited** D<sub>J</sub> states



- Quark model predicts many states [Godfrey and Isgur, PRD 32 (1985) 82], not all observed
- Large mass discrepancies, up to  $50 \, {\rm MeV}/c^2$
- Most  $J^P$  needs confirmation
  - natural  $J^P = 0^+, 1^-, 2^+$
  - innatural  $J^P = 0^-, 1^+, 2^-$
- The ground states  $(D, D^*)$ , and two of the 1P states,  $D_1(2420)$ and  $D_2^*(2460)$  are experimentally well established
- The broad L=1 states,  $D_0^{\ast}(2400)$  and  $D_1^{'}(2430)$  have been observed by B-factories in exclusive B decays
- BaBar has found new states decaying to  $D\pi$ ,  $D^*\pi$  [PRD 82,111101 (2010)]

## Excited $D_J$ states @ LHCb [arXiv.1307.4556]



Search for  $D_J$  states decaying to  $D^0\pi^+$ ,  $D^+\pi^-$ ,  $D^{*+}\pi^$ by reconstructing  $D^0 \to K^-\pi^+$ ,  $D^+ \to K^-\pi\pi$  and  $D^{*+} \to D^0\pi^+$  using  $1 \, {\rm fb}^{-1}$  of data

 $D^+\pi^-$ 

•  $D_2^*(2640)^0$  + weak structures (2600 and 2750 MeV)

• Cross-feed:  $D_1(2420)^0$  or  $D_2^*(2460)^0 \to \pi^- D^{*+}(\to D^+ \pi^0 / \gamma)$ 

 $D^0\pi^+$ 

- $D_2^*(2640)^+$  + weak structures (2600 and 2750 MeV)
- Cross-feed:  $D_1(2420)^+$  or  $D_2^*(2460)^+ \to \pi^+ D^{*0}(\to D^0 \pi^0 / \gamma)$

 $D^{*+}\pi^{-}$ 

•  $D_1(2420)^0$  and  $D_2^*(2460)^0$  + weak structures (2500 and 2800 MeV)

## **Excited** $D_{I}$ states **@ LHCb** [arXiv.1307.4556]

- The  $D^{*+}\pi^{-}$  final state gives information on the spin-parity assignment of a given resonance
- In the rest frame of the  $D^{*+}\pi^-$  we define the helicity angle  $\theta_H$  as the angle between the  $\pi^-$ and the  $\pi^+$  from the  $D^{*+}$  decay
- Exploit differences in  $\theta_H$  distribution for natural/innatural spin-parity states to selectively • enhance/suppress some of them in  $D^{*+}\pi^{-}$  spectrum to determine the needed signal components and initialize the final fit



## **Spin-parity analysis**

Fit  $D^{*+}\pi^-$  mass spectrum in 10 bins of  $\cos \theta_H$  ( $\pi^-$  helicity angle) (resonance parameters fixed) to determine the angular distribution for each state

- Confirmation of spin-parity of  $D_1(2420)$  and  $D_2^*(2460)^0$  resonances
- Observed two natural parity  $(D_J^*(2650)^0 \text{ and } D_J^*(2760)^0)$  and two unnatural parity  $(D_J(2580)^0 \text{ and } D_J^*(2740)^0)$  resonances
- Resonance parameters in reasonable agreement with BaBar
- Broad structures observed around  $3000 \, {
  m MeV}/c^2$ , could be superpositions of several states

$D_J^*(2760)^0$	1-	$1D \ D_1^*(2796)$
$D_J(2580)^0$	$0^{-}???$	$2S D_0(2558)$

### Excited *D<sub>sJ</sub>* states



- Large discrepancy between predictions and experiment for  $D_{s0}^*(2317)$  and  $D_{s1}(2460)$ .
- $D_{s1}^*(2700)$  observed by BaBar (inclusive) and Belle (B decays).
- $D_{sJ}^*(2860)$  and  $D_{sJ}(3040)$  observed by BaBar.

## Excited $D_{sJ}$ states @ LHCb [JHEP 10.151 (2012)], $1 \, { m fb}^{-1}$

Search for states decaying to  $D^0K^+$  and  $D^+K^0_S$  by reconstructing  $D^0 \to K^-\pi^+$  (a),  $D^+ \to K^-\pi\pi$  (b), and  $K^0_S \to \pi\pi$  decaying inside (c) or outside (d) the vertex detector



Reduce DK combinatorial background by requiring  $\cos \theta > 0$ , where  $\theta$  is the kaon helicity angle in the DK frame

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## Excited $D_{sJ}$ states @ LHCb [JHEP 10.151 (2012)]

Observe the same structures in both final states, plus some feed-through from partially reconstructed  $D_{sJ}\to D^*K$  decays

Simultaneous fit to smooth background plus

- $D_{s2}^*(2573)^+$  spin 2
- $D_{s1}^*(2700)^+$  spin 1
- $D^*_{sJ}(2860)^+$  spin 0?

constraining the resonance parameters to be the same in both spectra

No evidence for states above  $3\,{\rm GeV}$ 



$m(D_{s1}^*(2700)^+)$	=	$2709.2 \pm 1.9(\text{stat}) \pm 4.5(\text{syst})$	$MeV/c^2$ ,
$\Gamma(D_{s1}^*(2700)^+)$	=	$115.8 \pm 7.3(\text{stat}) \pm 12.1(\text{syst})$	$MeV/c^2$ ,
$m(D_{sJ}^*(2860)^+)$	=	$2866.1 \pm 1.0(\text{stat}) \pm 6.3(\text{syst})$	$MeV/c^2$ ,
$\Gamma(D_{sJ}^*(2860)^+)$	=	$69.9 \pm 3.2(\text{stat}) \pm 6.6(\text{syst})$	$MeV/c^2$ .

First observation of these states in inclusive hadronic production Confirmation of the resonances observed at the B-factories, comparable precision

## **The** X(3872)

- New exotic mesons have been observed by different experiments: X(3872), X(4140),  $Z^{\pm}(4430)$
- First assigned to  $c\bar{c}$  charmonium states but they don't fit to diquark picture
- Many theoretical models to explain the nature of the XYZ states, with limited success
  - Tetraquark
  - Molecular state
  - Charmonium hybrids
  - Threshold effects
- The X(3872) is the first exotic meson observed
  - Discovered by Belle as a narrow peak in  $J/\psi \pi^+\pi^-$  invariant mass in  $B^+ \to (J/\psi \pi^+\pi^-)K^+$  decays [PRL 91 (2003) 262001].
  - Confirmed by BaBar, CDF and D0
  - Also LHCb studied it measuring production cross-section and mass with  $34.7\,{\rm pb}^{-1}$  [EPJ C72, 1972 (2012)]

## The X(3872) quantum numbers

- The existence of the X(3872) is beyond doubt but after 10 years the nature is still uncertain!
  - Extremely difficult to identify as a conventional charmonium state (Mass and decay mode disfavour  $c\bar{c}$  state)
  - C-parity known to be positive as  $X(3872) \to J/\psi\gamma$  observed by Belle [PRL 107 091803], BaBar [PRD 74 071101 (R)]
  - CDF helicity angle measurement [PRL 98 132002] excluded all  $J^{PC}$  except

• 
$$J^{PC} = 2^{-+}: \eta_{c2}(1^1D_2)$$

- $J^{PC} = 1^{++}$ :  $\chi_{c1}(2^3P_1)$  or exotic  $D^0D^*$  bound state or tetraquark
- BaBar analysis of  $X(3872)\to\omega J/\psi$  prefers  $2^{++}$  but does not exclude  $1^{++}$  [PRD 82, 011101(R)]
- Belle analysis of  $X(3872)\to J/\psi\pi^+\pi^-$  prefers  $1^{++}$  but does not exclude  $2^{-+}$  [PRD 84, 052004]

## X(3872) quantum numbers @ LHCb [arXiv:1302.6269]

- $B^+ \to X(3872)K^+$  with  $X(3872) \to J/\psi(\to \mu\mu)\pi^+\pi^-$ , 1 fb<sup>-1</sup>
  - $B^+ \rightarrow \psi(2S)K^+$  control channel for systematic studies/signal shape determination
  - Selection based on likelihood ratio classifier
  - 313 $\pm$ 26  $B^+ \rightarrow X(3872)K^+$ (568 $\pm$ 31 background events)



Angular correlations in the  $B^+$  decay chain carry information on the  $J^{PC}$  of the X(3872)

## The X(3872) quantum numbers @ LHCb

- Analysis performed in 5D exploiting all angular correlations
- 3 helicity angles + 2 angles between the decay planes

$$\Omega = (\cos \theta_X, \cos \theta_{\pi\pi}, \Delta \phi_{X,\pi\pi}, \cos \theta_{J/\psi}, \Delta \phi_{X,J/\psi})$$



- Matrix elements in the helicity formalism
  - $1^{++}$ : no free parameter
  - $2^{-+}$ : one complex parameter  $\alpha$  which accounts for the different LS combinations (L is the orbital angular momentum between the  $\pi\pi$  and the  $J/\psi$ , S is the sum of their spins)



- Projections in cos θ<sub>X</sub> for signal candidates
- Marginal differences in 1D distributions between J<sup>PC</sup> = 1<sup>++</sup> and J<sup>PC</sup> = 2<sup>-+</sup>
- Discrimination relies on correlations in specific phase-space regions

## X(3872) quantum numbers @ LHCb [arXiv:1302.6269]



• Conventional charmonium fading: only  $car{c}$  possibility:  $\chi_{c1}(2^3P_1)$  but mass is off

- non-conventional (exotic?) interpretation is favored
- More measurements are needed to elucidate nature of the X(3872)
  - More precise mass measurement (+ D masses)
  - Natural Width
  - Production properties and decay modes

## X(3872) Mass Measurement @ LHCb

If X(3872) is a  $\bar{D}^0 D^{*0}$  bound state:  $m(X(3872)) < m(D^0) + m(D^{*0})$ 



- Using LHCb  $D^0$  mass measurement [JHEP 06 (2013) 065]:  $E_B = m(D^0 D^{*0}) - m(X(3872)) = 0.09 \pm 0.28 \text{ MeV}/c^2$
- The result reinforces the conclusion that if the X(3872) is a molecule, it is extremely loosely bound!

## **Searching for new decay mode:** $X(3872) \rightarrow p\bar{p}$

- Search for intermediate states decaying to  $p\bar{p}$  in the  $B^+ \rightarrow p\bar{p}K^+$
- With 1 fb<sup>-1</sup> of data [EPJC 73, 2462 (2013)]
- $N(B^+ \to p\bar{p}K^+) = 6951 \pm 176$  and  $N(X(3872)) \to p\bar{p} = -9 \pm 8$



## X(4140) and X(4274)

• X(4140) observed by the CDF collaboration in  $B^+ \rightarrow J/\psi \phi K^+$  [PRL 102 (2009) 242002] + X(4274) [arXiv:1101.6058]: candidates for exotic bounds state

LHCb,  $0.37 \, {\rm fb}^{-1}$ , [PRD 85, 091103 (R) (2012)]

- $N(B^+ \rightarrow J/\psi \phi K^+) = 382 \pm 22$  (6 times more than CDF)
- Fit to  $M(J/\psi\phi) M(J/\psi)$  for candidates within  $M(B^{\pm}) = \pm 2.5\sigma$  and  $M(\phi) = \pm 15 \text{ MeV}/c^2$
- CDF fits overlaid scaled to 0.37 fb<sup>-1</sup>: N(X(4140))<sub>exp</sub> = 35 ± 9 ± 6, N(X(4274))<sub>exp</sub> = 53 ± 19
- Fit results:  $N(X(4140)) = 0.6 \ (< 7.1) \ [2.7\sigma]$  disagreement],  $N(X(4274)) = 0 \ (< 10)$
- LHCb does not confirm the narrow structures near threshold

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## **Conclusions**

- LHCb has observed many new  $B_c$  decay modes
- Mass of  $B_c$  known to  $< 1.5 \,\mathrm{MeV}/c^2$
- $\bullet\,$  First observation of  $B^*_{s2}(5840)^0$  and measurement of its natural width by LHCb
- LHCb performs mass and width measurements of excited  $D_{sJ}$
- LHCb performs mass and width measurements of excited  $D_J$
- LHCb has established the X(3872) quantum numbers as  $J^{PC} = 1^{++}$
- No observation of X(4140) and X(4274) by LHCb
- Most of the analysis done not with the entire statistics available: new and updated results coming soon!

## D<sup>0</sup> mass measurement



- $D^0 \to K^+ K^- K^- \pi^+$  from B semileptonic decays
- Semileptonic decays: good background reduction and high trigger rate
- $D^0$  decay has low energy release: low systematic
- Main source of the systematic error is the calibration of the momentum scale of the detector

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## X(3872) Angular Analysis

- Only  $\pi\pi$  P-wave contribution included
- Decay amplitude constructed in helicity formalism

• Helicity coupling  $A_{\lambda_{j/\psi,\lambda_{\pi\pi}}}$  include one complex parameter  $\alpha$  for  $J^{PC} = 2^{-+}$ , No free parameter for  $J^{PC} = 1 + +$ .

## X(3872) Angular Analysis

$$-2\ln \mathcal{L}(J_X) = -2s_w \sum_{i=1}^{N_{data}} w_i \frac{|\mathcal{M}(\Omega|J_X)|^2 \epsilon(\Omega)}{I(J_X)}$$

- Normalization  $I(J_X) = \int d\Omega |\mathcal{M}(\Omega|J_X)|^2 \epsilon(\Omega)$
- MonteCarlo integration uder the two hypothesis  $J_X^{PC} = 1^{++}/2^{-+}$  with detector acceptance/selection efficiency  $\epsilon(\Omega)$
- Background subtraction through sWeighting  $w_i$  (scale factor  $s_w$ )
- Fitting the  $2^{-+}$  hypothesis for helicity coupling:  $\alpha = (0.671 \pm 0.046, 0.280 \ pm 0.046)$  compatible with Belle result [PRD 84, 052004]
- Test statistic to determine  $J^{PC}$ :  $-2\ln[\mathcal{L}(2^{-+})/\mathcal{L}(1^{++})]$

# Fit to the Unnatural Parity Sample and Total sample



- Unnatural Parity Sample: fix all resonances parameters except for  $D_1(2420)^0$
- Total: all resonances parameters fixed

# Fit to the Unnatural Parity Sample and Total sample



• Cross-feeds (in red) produce a distortion of the  $D_2^\ast(2460)$  and  $D_2^\ast(2460)$  and  $D_J^\ast(2650)$  lineshapes

## A $\mu^+\mu^-$ resonance in $B^+ \to K^+\mu^-\mu^+$ at low recoil [arXiv:1307.7595]



- small recoil  $\rightarrow q^2 = m^2_{\mu\mu}$  above  $D\bar{D}$  threshold
- $\psi(3770)$  included with fixed parameters
- One additional resonance:  $M = 4191^{+9}_{-8}$ ,  $\Gamma = 65^{+22}_{-16} \,\mathrm{MeV}/c^2$ compatible with  $\psi(4160)$
- Y(4260) disfavoured by more than  $4\sigma$

$$\mathcal{B}(B^+ \to \psi(4160)K^+) \times \mathcal{B}(\psi(4160) \to \mu^+\mu^-) = (3.5^{=0.9}_{-0.8}) \times 10^{-9}$$
