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Crouching Sigma, Hidden Scalar in $\gamma\gamma \to \pi^0\pi^0$

There has long been speculation about the nature of the σ -resonance. For three decades Jaffe has argued for a tetraquark composition, while others have claimed it is largely a glueball. A key pointer to its nature is its coupling to two photons. Consequently, there have been recent proposals to observe this important scalar hiding in $\gamma \gamma \rightarrow \pi^0 \pi^0$. We show here that the σ is already crouching in this cross-section exactly as measured twenty years ago. What is new is that precise knowledge of the position of the σ -pole, provided by the analysis of the Roy equations, now allows its two photon coupling to be accurately fixed. Its two photon width is found to be (4.1 ± 0.3) keV, a value far too large for a gluonic, or even a tetraquark, state.

Dynamical Coupled-Channel Analysis at EBAC

Theory Center, JLAB

The Excited Baryon Analysis Center (EBAC) is conducting dynamical coupled-channel analyses of JLab data and other relevant data in order to extract N* parameters and to investigate the reaction mechanisms for mapping out the quark-gluon substructure of N*. This effort is also providing theoretical input to the data analyses by the experimental groups, especially by the CLAS collaboration at JLab.

2 Extract moments of the angular distribution (correcting for the CLAS acceptance) by log-likelihood fit

3 Describe moments in terms of partial waves

3 Parametrize partial waves in terms of known πτπ phase shits and unknown production amplitudes

4 Derive partial wave cross sections to compare with models
