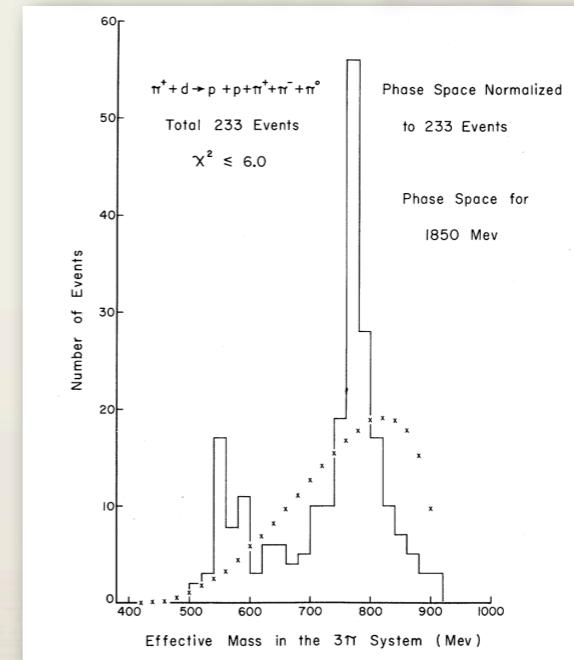
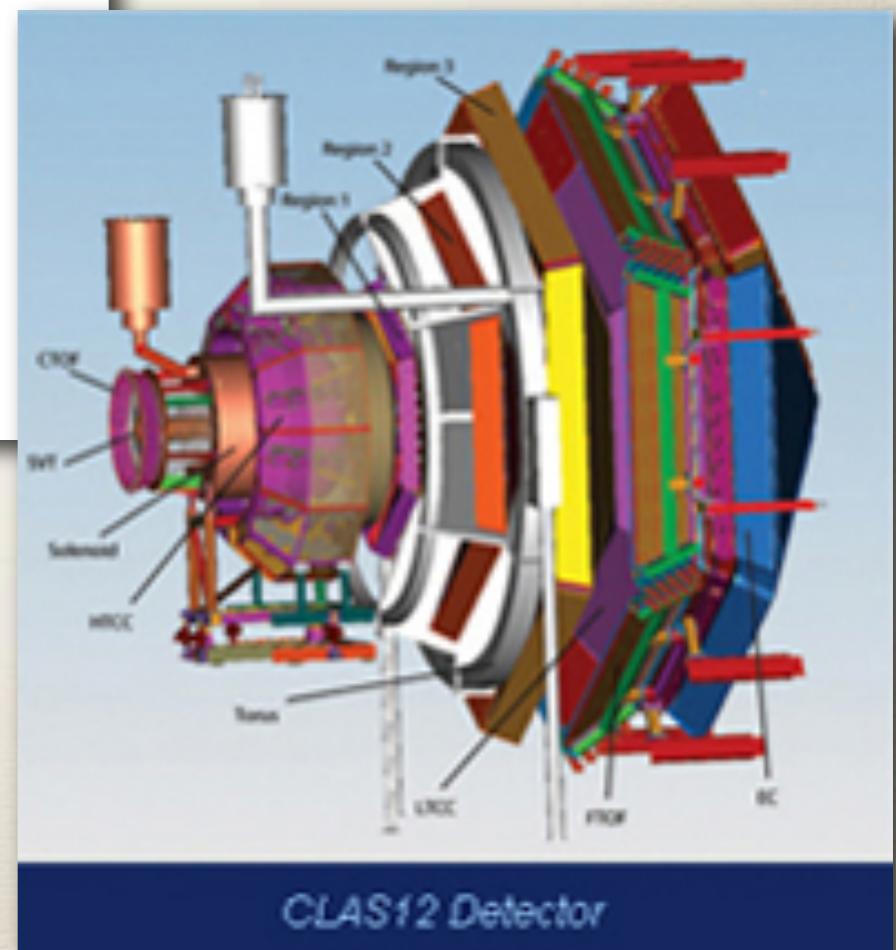
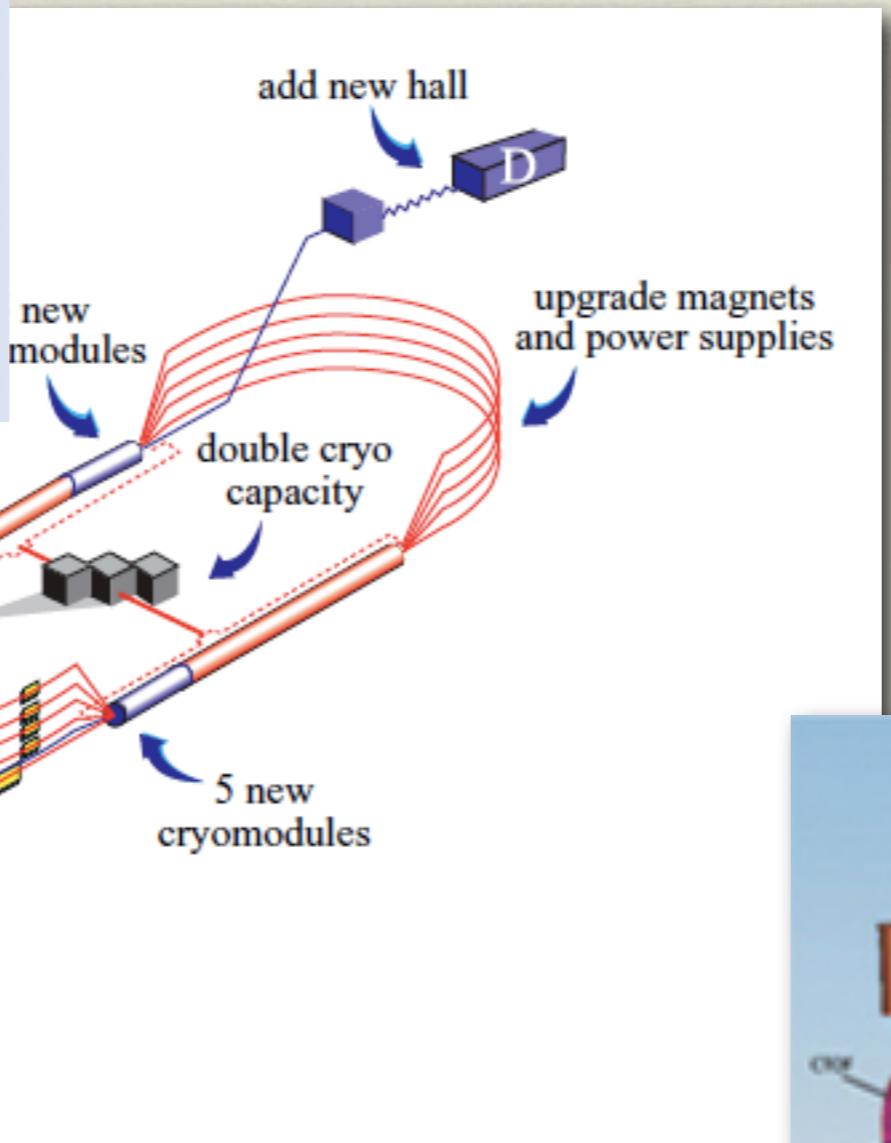
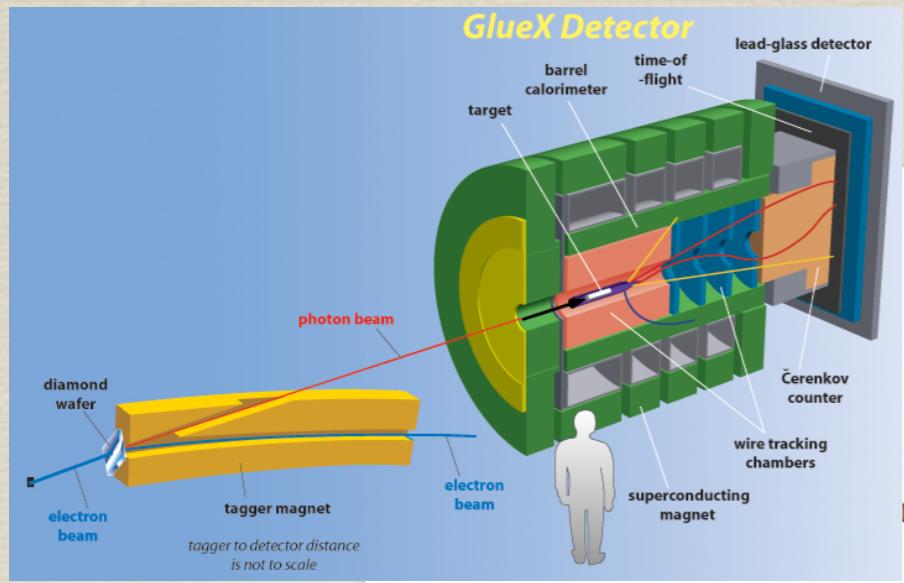
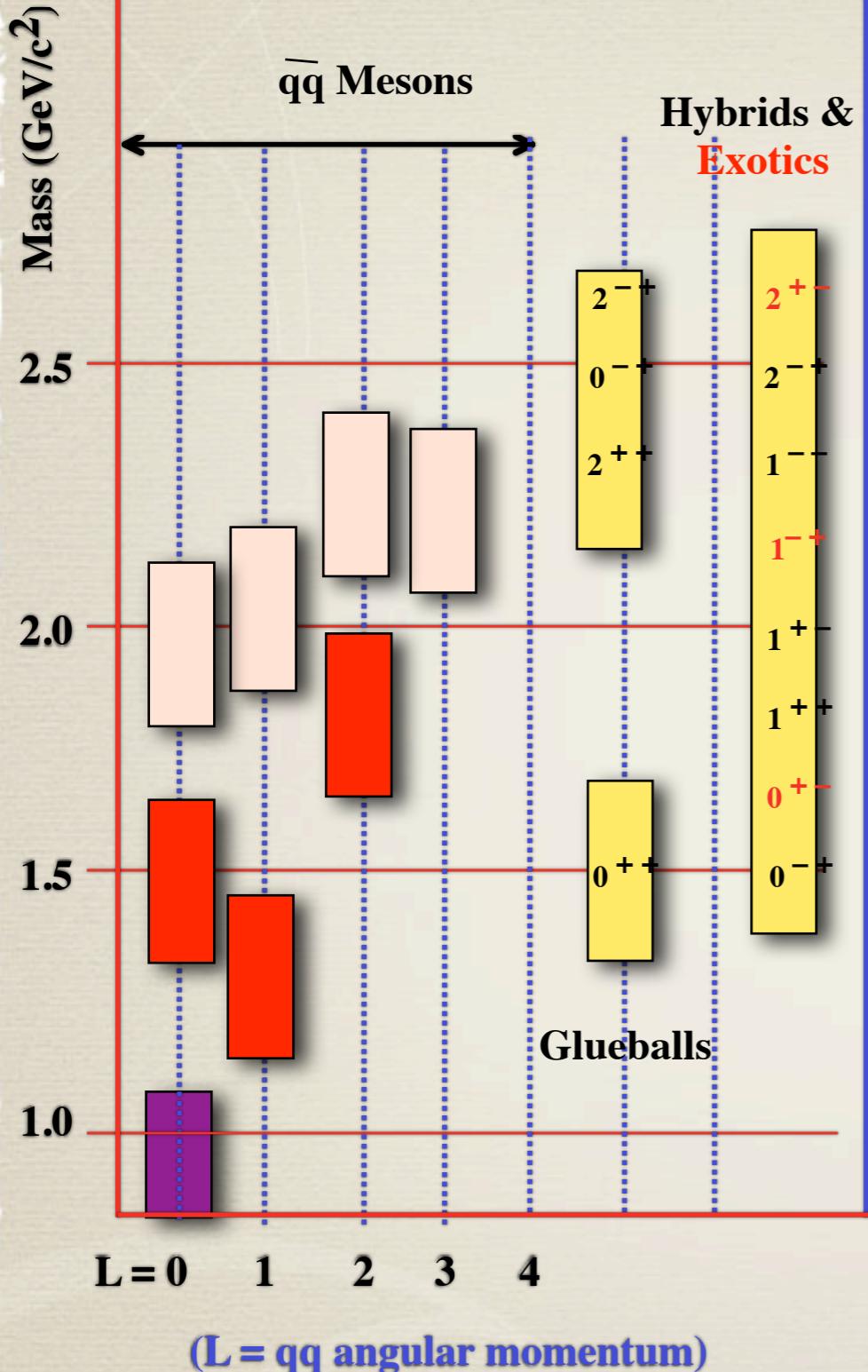


FIG. 2. Histogram of the effective mass of the three-pion system for 233 events.

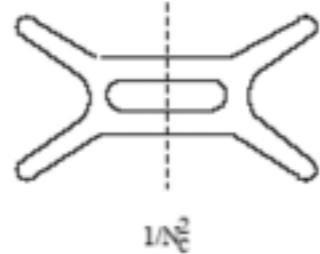
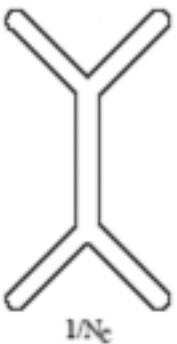


FIG. 3: Representative diagrams contributing to meson-meson scattering and their N_c scaling.

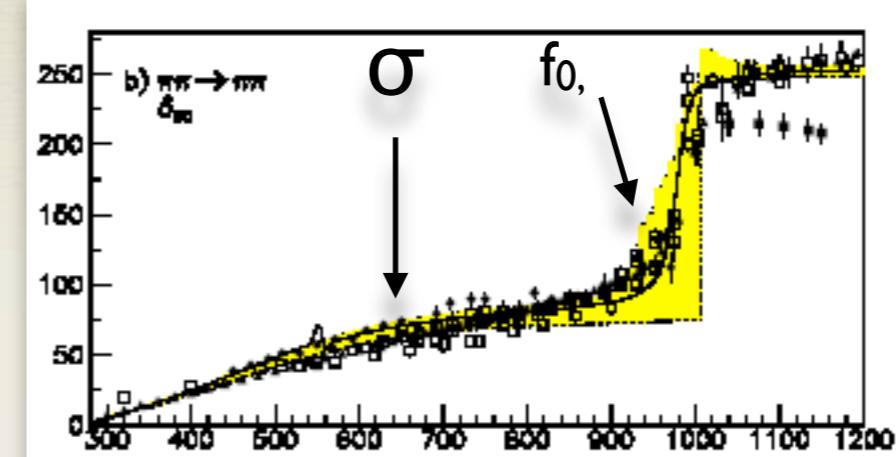

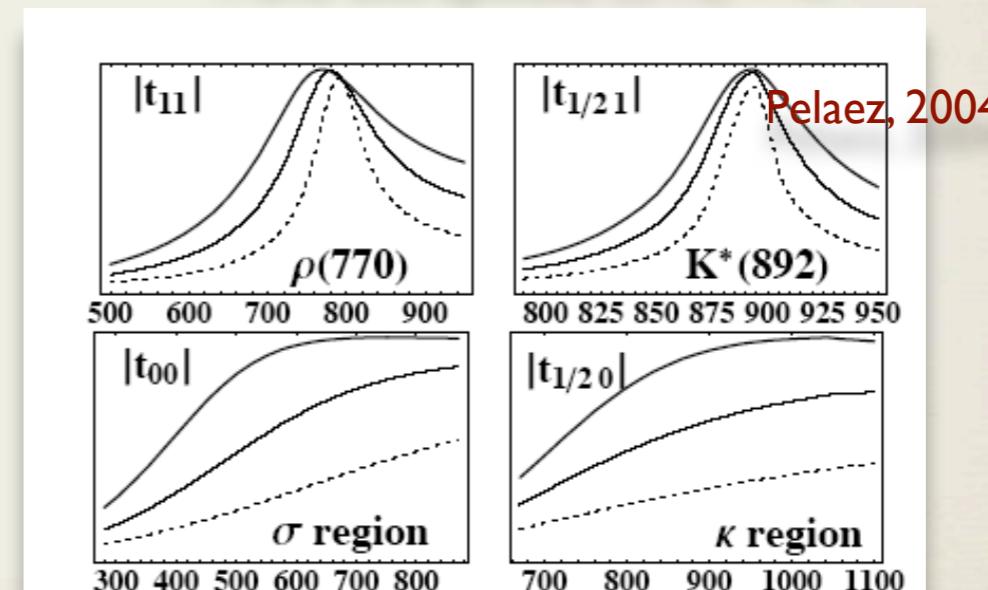
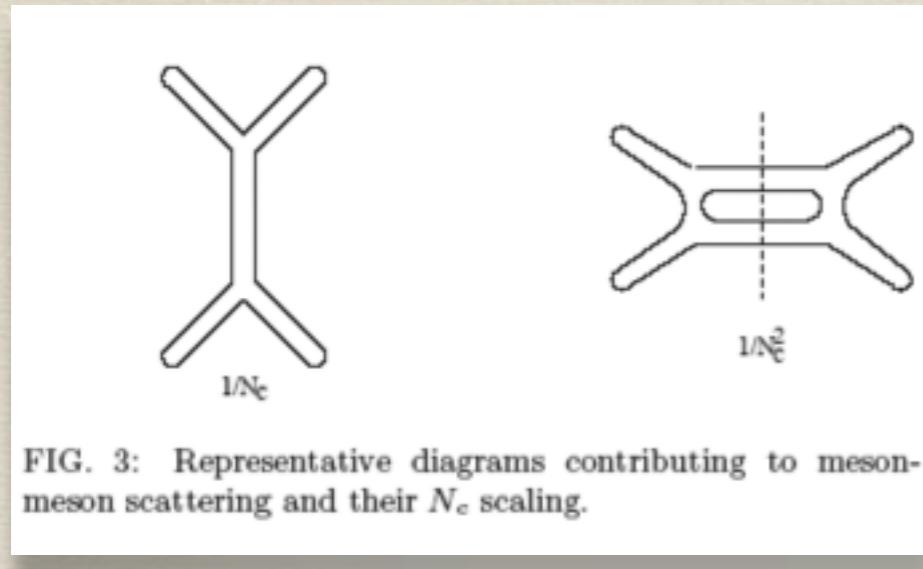


FIG. 1: Modulus of amplitudes in different meson-meson channels for $N_c = 3$ (thick line) $N_c = 5$ (thin continuous line) and $N_c = 10$ (thin dotted line), scaled at $\mu = 770$ MeV.

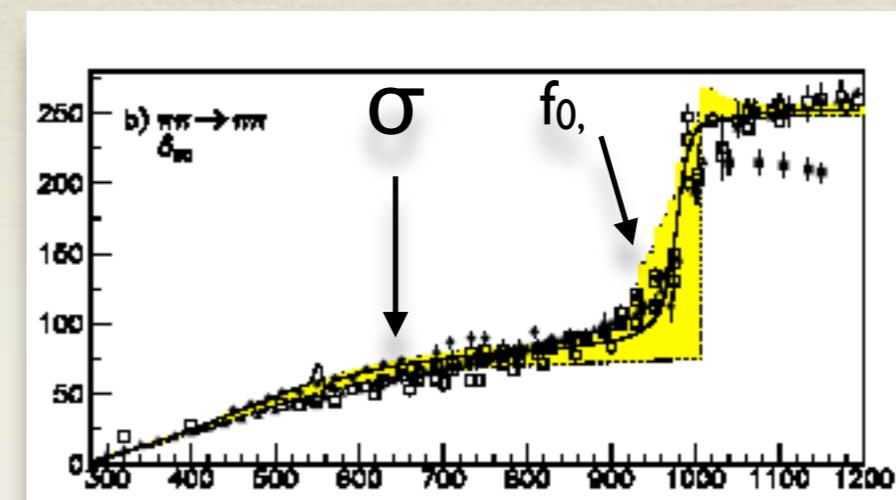

There has long been speculation about the nature of the σ -resonance. For three decades Jaffe has argued for a tetraquark composition, while others have claimed it is largely a glueball. A key pointer to its nature is its coupling to two photons. Consequently, there have been recent proposals to observe this important scalar hiding in $\gamma\gamma \rightarrow \pi^0\pi^0$. We show here that the σ is already crouching in this cross-section exactly as measured twenty years ago. What is new is that precise knowledge of the position of the σ -pole, provided by the analysis of the Roy equations, now allows its two photon coupling to be accurately fixed. Its two photon width is found to be (4.1 ± 0.3) keV, a value far too large for a gluonic, or even a tetraquark, state.

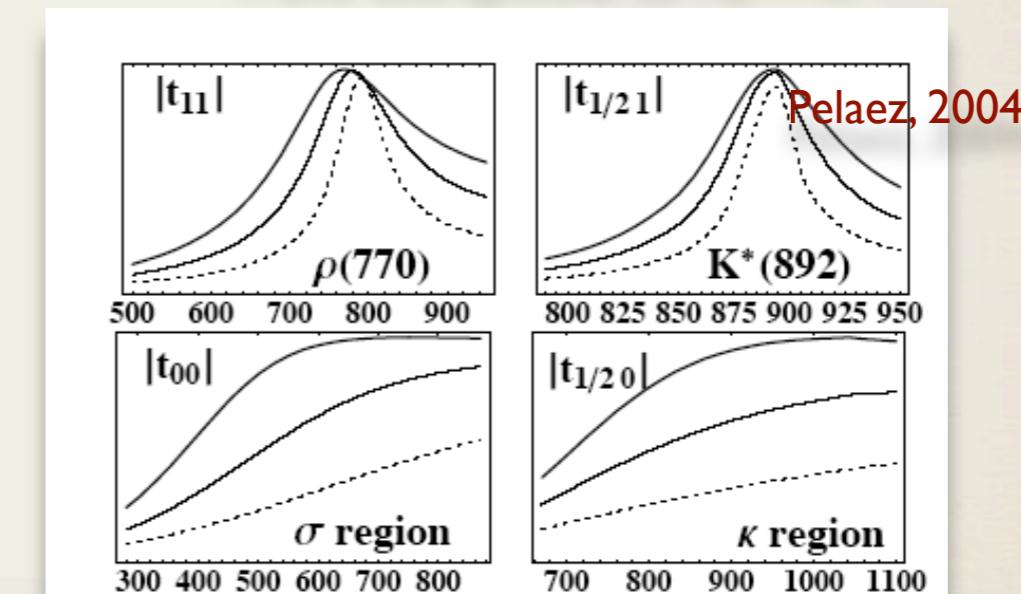
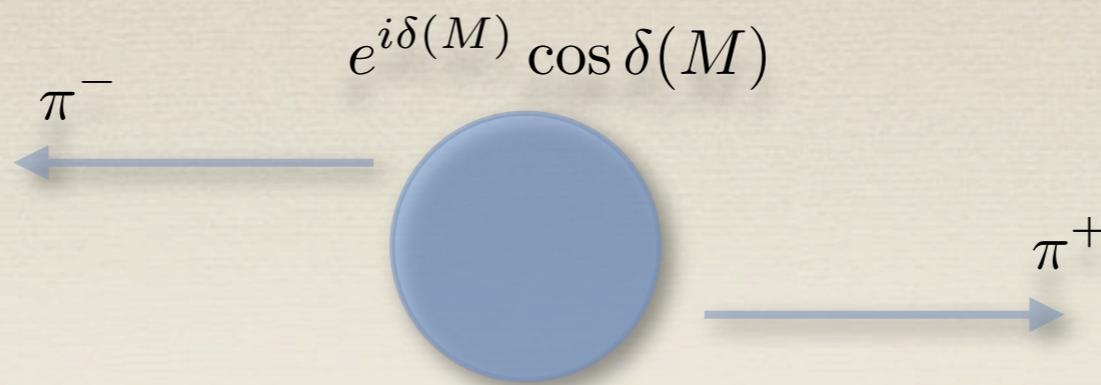


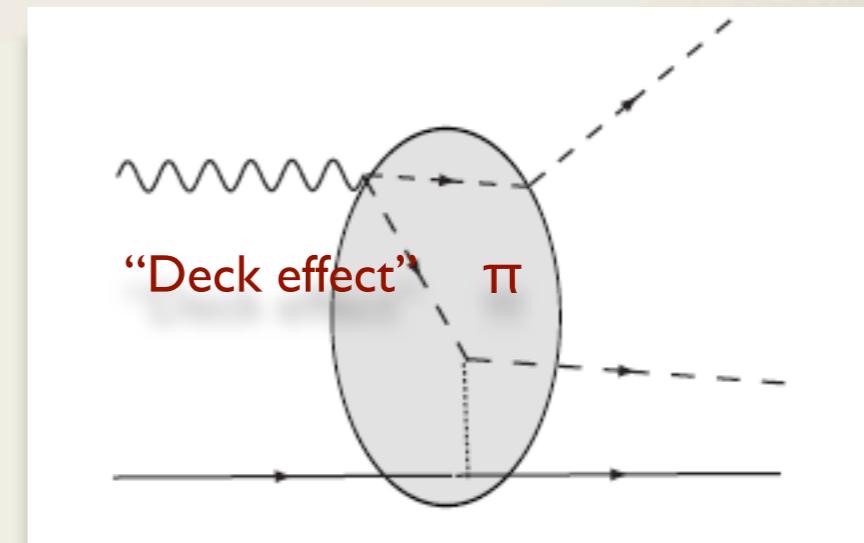
FIG. 1: Modulus of amplitudes in different meson-meson channels for $N_c = 3$ (thick line) $N_c = 5$ (thin continuous line) and $N_c = 10$ (thin dotted line), scaled at $\mu = 770$ MeV.

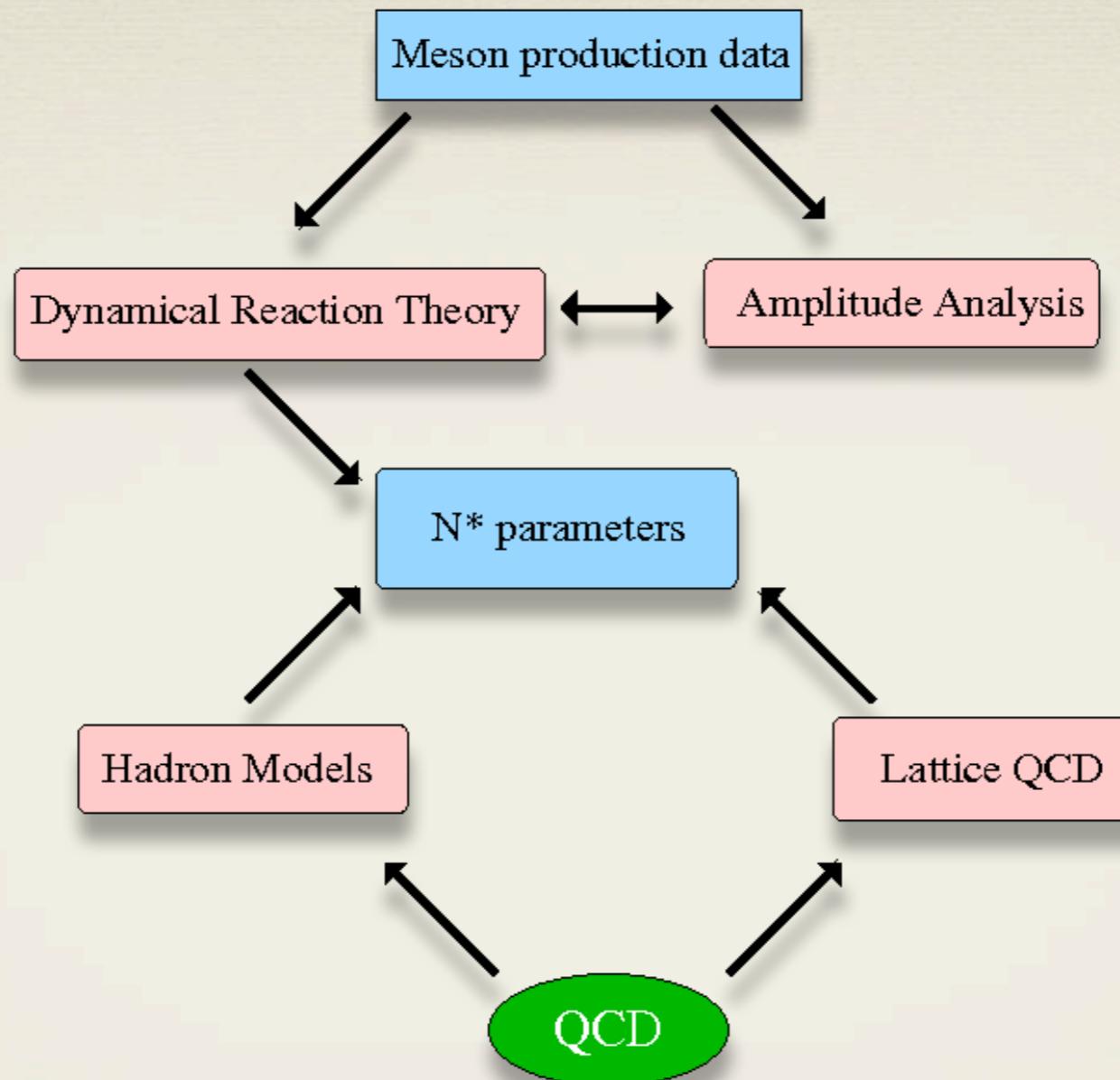


Dynamical Coupled-Channel Analysis at EBAC
