Elastic nucleon form factors

- basic quantities describing nucleon structure depend on single variable Q²
- intuitive interpretation as Fourier transformed spatial densities
- elastic scattering archetype of exclusive reaction
 validate dynamical approaches
- ► at large Q² (several GeV²) few if any other observables measuring GPDs hardly possible for large invariant nucleon momentum transfer

high precision desirable

- be able to see subtle trends
- ▶ may want to transform $G_{E,M}^{p,n} \to F_{1,2}^{u,d}$ \rightsquigarrow error propagation

+ graph with photon lines crossed

- \blacktriangleright at order $\alpha_{\rm em}$ interference of one- and two-photon exchange
- ▶ loop integral $\int d^4l \rightarrow$ all photon virtualities $(q-l)^2, l^2$ typical scale set by Q^2

 \rightsquigarrow doubly virtual Compton amplitude $\mathcal{A}(\gamma^*p \rightarrow \gamma^*p)$

 \blacktriangleright contributes with opposite sign to e^+p and e^-p

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- ▶ loop integral $\int d^4l \rightarrow$ all photon virtualities $(q-l)^2, l^2$ typical scale set by Q^2

 \leadsto doubly virtual Compton amplitude $\mathcal{A}(\gamma^*p \rightarrow \gamma^*p)$

- ▶ contributes with opposite sign to e^+p and e^-p
- IR divergence for l → 0 cancelled by soft bremsstrahlung in following always understood that this is included

Two photon exchange affects

- \blacktriangleright unpolarized cross section $~\rightsquigarrow~$ Rosenbluth separation
- double spin asymmetries:

 P_L , P_S : polarization of recoil proton for positive-helicity e beam longitudinal and transverse in scattering plane (sideways) A_L , A_S : corresponding asymmetries for polarized beam and target time reversal symmetry $\rightsquigarrow A_L = -P_L$ and $A_S = P_S$

- these go with $\operatorname{Re} \mathcal{A}(\gamma^*p \to \gamma^*p)$
- single spin asymmetries:

 $P_N = A_N$: proton polarization normal to scattering plane

• goes with $\operatorname{Im} \mathcal{A}(\gamma^* p \to \gamma^* p)$

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- candidate for explaining discrepancy of G_E/G_M extracted by Rosenbluth separation and recoil method (P_S/P_L)
- ► theory: effects on Rosenbluth sep. can be large and increase with Q²

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- ▶ effects on P_S/P_L expected small but not negligible if aim at precision
- find effects of similar size for neutron target

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Dynamics



- no calculation of two-photon amplitude from first principles is more complicated than form factors themselves
- for low Q²: hadronic intermediate states nucleon, Δ, ...
 P.G.Blunden et al., S.Kondratyuk et al. '03-'07
- ▶ for large $Q^2 \rightarrow \text{large } \hat{s} = (p + q l)^2$ need more and more resonances $\rightarrow \text{ partonic description more efficient}$ A.Afanasev et al. '04, '05



► factorized into quark-level process eq → eq and 1/x moment of generalized parton distributions

 \blacktriangleright large $Q^2 ~\rightsquigarrow$ struck quark carries most of nucleon momentum $x \to 1,$ Feynman mechanism

- analogous description for wide-angle Compton scattering A.Radyushkin '98; M.D., Th.Feldmann, R.Jakob, P.Kroll '98, '04; ...
 - no factorization proof as for DVCS
 - \blacktriangleright promising phenomenology for $\gamma p \to \gamma p$ data
- possible strategy (my assessment):
 - use factorized approach to estimate two-photon exchange
 - use experimental information on two-photon exchange to further test/constrain approach

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A closer look at observables

▶ parameterize $\mathcal{A}(ep \to ep)$ for conserved lepton helicity by three generalized form factors $\widetilde{G}_M, \widetilde{G}_E, \widetilde{F}_3$

$$\widetilde{G}_M = G_M(Q^2) + \delta \widetilde{G}_M(Q^2, \epsilon)$$
$$\widetilde{G}_E = G_E(Q^2) + \delta \widetilde{G}_E(Q^2, \epsilon)$$
$$\widetilde{F}_3 = \delta \widetilde{F}_3(Q^2, \epsilon)$$

where $\delta \widetilde{G}_M, \delta \widetilde{G}_E, \delta \widetilde{F}_3 \propto \alpha_{\rm em} \, \mathcal{A}(\gamma^* p \to \gamma^* p)$

- are complex-valued
- \bullet change sign when replace e^- with e^+

- \blacktriangleright two-photon exchange modifies ϵ dependence at given Q^2
- ► two-photon terms in P_S, P_L differ from those in σ_R → cannot obtain from measuring charge asymmetry A_C =

$$\frac{\sigma_R(e^+) - \sigma_R(e^-)}{\sigma_R(e^+) + \sigma_R(e^-)}$$

- ▶ with $\sigma_R(e^+) + \sigma_R(e^-)$ can do usual Rosenbluth separation
- ▶ with polarized e^+ and e^- have 6 observables for 5 unknowns $(G_M, G_E, \delta \widetilde{G}_M, \delta \widetilde{G}_E, \delta \widetilde{F}_3) \Rightarrow$ full model indep't extraction

• ϵ dependence of P_L, P_S and measurement of P_N JLAB E-04-019 (Hall C): four points in ϵ at $Q^2 = 3.2 \,\text{GeV}^2$

Conclusions (first part)

- elastic nucleon form factors = backbone observables for nucleon structure
- JLAB12 upgrade offers possibilities to significantly extend precision data to high Q^2
- two-photon exchange
 - affect precision of obtained results (σ_R or polarization method)
 - interest in itself: factorized partonic description complementary to wide-angle Compton scattering program
- possibilities with unpolarized e^+ :
 - charge asymmetry: exhibit two-photon effects

and validate dynamical calculations

• $\sigma(e^+) + \sigma(e^-)$: Rosenbluth separation

with polarized e^+ and recoil or target polarization:

▶ full model-independent extraction of form factors and two-photon exchange amplitudes
approx. $m_e = 0$

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Generalized parton distributions: some brief reminders

- \blacktriangleright defined from matrix elements $\left\langle p'\right| \mathcal{O}\left|p\right\rangle$

- ▶ depend on two mom. fractions x, ξ and $t = (p' p)^2$ and on factorization scale
- spin structure for conserved parton helicity:

DVCS

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- defined from matrix elements $\langle p' | \mathcal{O} | p \rangle$
 - $\mathcal{O} =$ operator with quark or gluon fields along light cone same as for usual parton densities





Key processes (with factorization theorems)

- deeply virtual Compton scattering:
 - NLO and NNLO corrections known and typically small

- large number of observables accessible to GPD approach both twist-two and twist-three amplitudes
- meson electroproduction:
 - quantitative theoretical analysis more difficult important radiative and power corrections
 - information on aspects difficult to study in DVCS: gluon distributions, quark flavor structure

Different roles of real and imaginary part

amplitudes for DVCS and vector meson production at LO in α_s :

$$\operatorname{Im} \mathcal{H}(\xi, t) = \pi \left[H(\xi, \xi, t) - H(-\xi, \xi, t) \right]$$

simple and direct relation, similar to inclusive DIS

two representations for real part:

$$\operatorname{Re} \mathcal{H}(\xi, t) = \operatorname{PV} \int_{-1}^{1} dx \, H(x, \xi, t) \left[\frac{1}{\xi - x} - \frac{1}{\xi + x} \right]$$
$$= \operatorname{PV} \int_{-1}^{1} dx \, H(x, x, t) \left[\frac{1}{\xi - x} - \frac{1}{\xi + x} \right] + C(t)$$

access to x values different from measured $\xi = x_B/(2-x_B)$ C(t) related with Polyakov-Weiss D-term

for brevity suppress quark flavor labels analogous eq's for mesons with other quantum numbers

- Q^2 dependence from evolution:

 $\frac{d}{d\ln Q^2} H(\xi,\xi,t;Q^2) = \text{kernel} \otimes \left\{ H(x,\xi,t;Q^2) \text{ for } |x| \ge \xi \right\}$

- sensitive to GPD in region $|x| \geq \xi$
- beyond leading order in α_s find
 - amplitude determined by GPD in region $|x| \ge \xi$ and more complicated subtraction constant

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Making the most of DVCS

▶ use interference with Bethe-Heitler process:



 \blacktriangleright cross section for $ep \rightarrow e\gamma p$

$$\frac{d\sigma_{\rm VCS}}{dx_B \, dQ^2 \, dt} : \frac{d\sigma_{\rm BH}}{dx_B \, dQ^2 \, dt} \sim \frac{1}{y^2} \frac{1}{Q^2} : \frac{1}{t} \qquad \qquad y = \frac{Q^2}{x_B s_{ep}}$$

- interference term visible unless y is very small
- \blacktriangleright key variable: azimuth ϕ between lepton and hadron planes
- following slides:
 - \blacktriangleright how to extract the interference, relevance of e^+ beam
 - possibilities with lepton and nucleon polarization

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GPD combinations in interference term made simple

Conclusions (second part)

- DVCS is key process to access generalized parton distributions
- most direct access to GPDs from Im part of amplitude sensitivity to wider x range from Re part
- two benefits of e^+ beams:
 - separate Im part of interference from pure DVCS contribution in principle can do Rosenbluth separation instead but requires feasibility study (lever arm, control of errors)
 - give Re part of interference
 - a part of this separation requires $e^{+}\ {\rm polarization}$
